*Albemarle County School Board Adopts 2025-26 Budget to Sustain Excellence for Students, Staff, and Schools*—The Albemarle County School Board has adopted the 2025–26 fiscal year budget, a \$284 million plan that strengthens investments in students, staff, and academic programs. The budget, effective July 1, 2025, was balanced through \$14 million in new County funding and \$7 million in strategic reductions.

Key initiatives in the approved budget include expanding academic programs focused on accelerated learning and career readiness, improving literacy and math interventions, and enhancing student safety with the addition of two School Resource Officers. The division is also increasing support for students with intensive special education needs.

A significant portion of the budget continues to fund core operations, including competitive pay and benefits for staff, as well as rising costs in transportation, health insurance, and facility maintenance—critical elements of a high-quality, equitable education system.

"We are grateful to Albemarle County for its partnership and support," said Superintendent Dr. Matthew Haas. "Their investment helped close the budget gap and advance our mission."

Albemarle County Public Schools Celebrates 2024-25 Outstanding Educators and Staff—Albemarle County Public Schools (ACPS) is proud to announce the nominees and winners of its 2024-25 division-wide recognition program, which honors excellence among educators, support staff, and school and division leaders. The Licensed Employee of the Year award celebrates licensed staff members such as classroom teachers, school counselors, librarians, instructional coaches, and speech pathologists. The Classified Employee of the Year award recognizes non-teaching staff who play vital roles in schools and departments, such as office associates, custodians, bus drivers, and other support professionals. The program also includes a Leader of the Year award for division administrators and school leaders who exemplify the ACPS mission.
