Use of RCV in Virginia

- Only local election in Virginia conducted using RCV
- Arlington County Democratic Primary June 2023
- Exit Polling reported that 41% of those polled did not like RCV
- and would like to return to regular voting
- Questions were brought by candidates who questioned the
- ballot tabulation methods
- Richmond City Council voted in 2022 to have no RCV thru 2024*

Of the 40 Wilkie ballots, 30-2nd place votes went for Altman and 10 for Sharp

2nd Round Elimination

Of the 180 first-round Sharp ballots, 30 voters chose Wilkie as their second choice and voted no third choice, 150 of Sharp's first-place ballots chose George Hovis as their second choice and had no third choice. The 10-2nd round ballots Sharp picked up from Wilkie all chose Valarie Altman as their third choice.

BUT NOW WE HAVE A PROBLEM

As we go to redistribute Alice Sharp's ballots, 30 of them chose Phil Wilkie as their second choice, but Phil Wilkie is no longer part of the election. Those 30 votes for Phil Wilkie cannot legally be given to anyone else. The ballots can no longer be used, they contain no votes which can be given to anyone. They are "exhausted." 150 votes go to George Hovis and 10 go to Valarie Altman. There are now only 970 ballots remaining in the election.

3rd Round Elimination

Result: Neither of the two remaining candidates picks up additional votes. Altman's 300 votes are no longer part of the election. The total votes still assigned to each candidate are now a percentage of the votes remaining in the election, which is 680.

New York City mayoral race

Tabulation of the most recent NYC race using RCV

Over 3 weeks to tabulate final results

First round won by 10 points

After 9 rounds of elimination winner won by 2 points

THE DISADVANTAGES OF RCV

- New, proprietary, RCV ballot-tabulating software must be purchased.
- If you undervote, your ballot is eliminated after all votes are exhausted and you are, at that point, no longer part of the election.
- RCV counts 2nd and 3rd place votes the same as 1st place votes (once distributed)
- This encourages you to vote for all candidates, even of the opposite party, if you want your ballot to remain in the redistribution.

Problems for voters

- Less well informed and less well educated will have difficulty marking a RCV ballot and
 may be disenfranchised
- Voter must vote for candidates other than first choice or candidates voter doesn't like

Delayed Results

Election Night results will report ONLY First Round Results

All results must be reported by Precincts, but to report RCV

All ballots MUST be counted together

This RCV redistribution of votes cannot be done until all ballots

can be counted

Mailed-in and Provisional ballots will be delayed for Over a week

Virginia Department of Elections

- **ELECT report 2023** states that the law requiring that
- all votes be reported By Precinct

Cannot be followed using RCV

Problems Understanding of Ballot

- The elderly who have been voting a regular, one candidate vote will be confused, will have difficulty learning how to mark the RCV ballot
- The less well informed voter will know about only their favorite candidate and will be unable to mark the RCV ballot

Polling Place Problems

 Lines in the polling places will be long as voters try to correctly mark the RCV ballot

Many "spoiled" ballots, so more ballots will be required

NO Need

- Albemarle County has no more than
- two or three candidates per race.

Frequently only one candidate per race.
