My name is Elayne Phillips and, although I now live in Charlottesville City, I lived in the county, in West Leigh subdivision, for twenty years. I write in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I was one of the founders of Congregation Beth Israel (CBI)'s Preschool more than twenty-five years ago. The preschool thrived at the synagogue location and was a respected educational program with a waiting list almost since its inception. As a result of COVID in 2020, the school has been transformed into an outdoor Forest School. Children, toddlers through elementary school age, spend most of their day in nature, living the school's purpose to repair the world together through outdoor experiential learning.

I understand that there have been questions raised from neighbors about the school moving onto the property. I know that folks who move to the country do so, in part, to have a quiet experience, with no

noise or people disrupting their peace. Realistically, they cannot expect that this property will never be developed. The question, then, is what is the best use of the space? The CBI Forest School has addressed the water and traffic concerns in other materials submitted to the Board. The school will leave a much smaller footprint than many other potential developments, including residential sites. CBI Forest School is committed to respecting and conserving the natural world surrounding the school and to preserving the natural resources that abound on the property.

I urge you to vote in support of the proposed CBI Forest School development on the Dudley Mountain Road property. I don't dismiss the concerns that have been raised, but I urge you and the local residents to listen carefully to how the School will operate on the site. I am writing today in support of Congregation Beth Israel's (CBI) request for a Special Use Permit to establish a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I certainly understand why neighbors on Dudley Mountain Road might be concerned about this land-use proposal, especially in an area not zoned for this type of project. One issue that appears to be a concern is traffic congestion and road safety. To address this concern, CBI has offered to stagger drop off and pick up of students at the school. Instead of a 15-minute window for morning drop off and a 15 minute window for afternoon pickup, CBI has offered to stagger these windows to 60 minutes each. Additionally, CBI has offered to deploy a shuttle bus to transport students to the school from a location in the City of Charlottesville. These concessions seem generous and a commitment by CBI to addressing the neighborhood's concern.

Another issue neighbors are concerned about is the preservation of the property's natural environment. As a reminder, the former owner of this property had proposed a dense subdivision on the land and an adjacent parel. To avert this project and protect the rural environment, a local couple purchased the property. When they learned that CBI could make great use of the land for its Forest School, with a minimal footprint, they donated the land to CBI. A conservation easement will ensure that CBI maintains the natural environment on this parcel in perpetuity. Additionally, CBI has enrolled in the Dept. of

Forestry Hardwood Initiative, with the first phase of activity focused on removing invasive species along the stream bisecting the property. CBI also has enrolled in the James River Buffer Program to remove invasive species in the riparian areas along either side of Dudley Mountain Road.

All of these commitments from CBI lead me to believe its Forest School would be a very considerate-and beneficial--neighbor to the Dudley Mountain Road neighborhood. I encourage you to approve the special use permit.

It's true that there other outdoor schools in the area, but CBI is the only outdoor preschool serving children younger than five years of age. I implore the County to do everything in its power to ensure that CBI Forest School has a permanent home.

Outdoor school programs—educational models that prioritize learning in natural environments—have offer a wide range of developmental, cognitive, and emotional benefits to young children. The benefits of outdoor education span multiple domains, supporting the whole child.

Recognizing that the prevalence of anxiety and depression among children and adolescents now represents a significant public health issue, the positive impacts of outdoor education are especially relevant.

Below is a summary of the key benefits of outdoor preschool, and makes a strong case, I hope, for ensuring that outdoor preschool remains a part of the County's educational offerings:

1. Cognitive Development and Academic Achievement

Outdoor learning environments stimulate curiosity and foster problem-solving. Research shows that children who regularly engage with nature demonstrate improved concentration, memory, and creativity. Activities like observing wildlife, navigating trails, and experimenting with natural materials help children develop critical thinking and inquiry skills. Moreover, integrating core subjects such as science, math, and language arts into nature-based contexts enhances relevance and retention, making learning more meaningful and experiential.

2. Physical Health and Motor Skills

Spending extended time outdoors promotes physical activity, which is essential for children's health. Climbing, running, balancing, and lifting natural objects improve gross and fine motor skills, coordination, and strength. Exposure to fresh air and sunlight boosts immunity, regulates circadian rhythms, and may prevent issues like childhood obesity. Importantly, outdoor play helps counteract the sedentary lifestyle increasingly common among young children in screen-dominated indoor environments.

4. Environmental Stewardship and Connection to Nature

Early exposure to nature fosters a lifelong appreciation for the environment. Children who learn in outdoor settings often develop a stronger sense of responsibility toward the natural world. They become more aware of ecological systems, sustainability, and the impact of human actions. These early values

are critical in raising environmentally conscious citizens prepared to address global environmental challenges.

5. Inclusivity and Support for Diverse Learning Styles

Outdoor school supports multiple intelligences and accommodates diverse learning styles. Kinesthetic learners thrive in physically active environments, while visual and auditory learners benefit from rich sensory experiences in nature. My name is Raya Cantor and I live in the Rio district of Albemarle County. I'm writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I have been a member of, and employed by, Congregation Beth Israel since moving to this area in June 2014. I see every day the impact that our congregation and our school have on our member families, students, and the community at large. CBI is the only synagogue in Charlottesville, and our Forest School serves Jewish and non-Jewish families, currently about 100 students ages 18 months through 4th grade. With this new location we could increase our capacity to up to 144 students. We are the only full-time Jewish nature -based school in the country and the largest nature-based preschool in Virginia.

Although my own child is now in college, as a resident of Albemarle County, I am concerned about the fact that we have more demand for early childhood education than we can currently provide. If CBI is able to operate at this new location and increase our capacity, we could be part of a solution to this problem.

I know that some neighbors on Dudley Mountain Road have expressed their concerns about the school's impact on the environment, water consumption, and the road, and I believe CBI is doing all the right things in addressing these concerns. It is after all a Forest School, dedicated to using nature

as a classroom to educate children and guide them in becoming stewards of the land, and thoughtful, contributing citizens.

Through a conservation easement, the CBI Forest School will limit the future development of this beautiful property and ensure that the wilderness is maintained. They have also already enrolled in the Department of Forestry Hardwood Initiative, which will focus on removing invasive species along the stream bisecting this property, and in the James River Buffer Program to remove invasive species and plant new hardwoods in the riverside areas along both sides of Dudley Mountain Road.

CBIFS is also investigating options to limit water use, such as rainwater catchment and low-flow fixtures. It is also important to note that a school building on this property will use far less water than if the property were divided into 4 large home sites. If the school doesn't receive this Special Use Permit, that's what could happen.

To mitigate the traffic challenges on the road, CBIFS plans to stagger morning drop-off and pick-up of students, and offer a shuttle bus to transport students to school from the city.

I urge the Planning Commission to carefully review the CBI Forest School development plans and consider all of the positive impacts this school can make - on our environment, and most importantly on our children.

This year, due to logistical reasons, we are back in Albemarle Public Schools. But we've talked often about how much we loved the Forest School and the nurturing and exploration-driven environment.

I know that some nearby residents have expressed concerns about the project, but I believe that CBI's thoughtful architectural and operational plans mitigate all of them. Mainly, I have seen concerns that the school will disrupt the rural, natural setting. But the Forest School's mission is based on encouraging students to appreciate, observe, and protect the natural environment. So the school's design and

operation will be devoted to preserving and protecting the natural landscape. For example, the site plan thoughtfully and intentionally spreads out the buildings and sets them back from the main road to preserve an unspoiled feel.

From its inception during the COVID pandemic, the Forest School team has demonstrated an incredible ability to adopt and evolve to their surroundings—and to be good stewards of the land. I have no doubt that CBI and the Forest School team will work seriously and in good faith to be respectful neighbors and to work with nearby residents to address any logistical concerns that arise.

And the Forest School won't just benefit the school's teachers, families, and staff. All of Albemarle County will benefit. On the tangible side, of course, the Forest School will educate dozens of students per year, reducing the strain on the County's public schools and freeing up resources for the County's current student population. Moreover, the Forest School will be a place where local children and their families will gather to learn reading and math—but also respect for nature and for their fellow humans. And those values, that goodness, and that creativity will radiate out into the rest of Albemarle County—and beyond.

I have been to countless County meetings over the past decade. And I know how important the Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission—indeed, we all—think it is to educate and engage the next generation of citizens who will work cooperatively to protect our local environment and promote the public good. That's exactly what the Forest School will do. If we're serious about that mission, here is a chance to support it.

Put simply, Albemarle County will be much better off for having this special, special school operating on Dudley Mountain Road. And the County will be a worse place if the amazing work of the Forest School is not allowed to continue.

My name is Scott Supraner and I have lived in the Rivanna District of Albemarle County for over twenty-five years. I am writing to register my support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

One of the things I love best about the Charlottesville-Albemarle area are the many influences which contribute to the rich and eclectic culture of our region. We moved here to ensure that our son could receive an education suited to his abilities. He moved between public and private options; in the city and county. I believe all parents should have the opportunity to choose a school environment best suited to their children's needs.

The CBI Forest School offers a unique approach to early childhood education. It is the only Jewish day school in central Virginia. Attendance at the school is open to all students, in fact 25% of the current enrollment is not Jewish. Its emphasis on a nature driven curriculum is evidenced not only in its philosophy, but in its practice as well. Outdoor instruction and hands-on activities offer parents and students a different approach to primary education. In this regard, it is a welcome alternative to families of any faith. With respect for nature at the core of its mission statement, the school would be a good custodian to the Dudley Mountain property.

The 165 acre property was purchased by the current owners in 2023 in an effort to rescue it from development as a dense, for-profit subdivision. When they discovered that the Forest School could use the land in an ecologically sustainable manner, they chose to donate the land to CBI. (The owners do not have children and are not temple members.) The land will be protected from future division under a conservation easement, after the final construction proposal is approved.

CBI has made every effort to respond to the concerns of the surrounding community. As regards traffic, the school has proposed an expanded arrival time window and shuttle bus service to minimize traffic, and has offered the possibility of widening the road in some areas to facilitate travel. Water usage by the staff, students and visitors has been shown to be far less than the current development possibility of constructing four private homes on the property. In addition, CBI is considering incorporating rainwater capture to reduce its consumption in areas of non-potable water usage (such as flushing toilets and watering plants.)

The Forest school is losing its current location due to new housing construction on the property. Alternative sites that are zoned commercial and eligible for school construction are virtually non-existent. The property at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road so perfectly aligns with the needs and the philosophy of the Forest School that it would be a shame to see this opportunity pass by. A permanent home would allow the school to continue serving its children and families. It would keep the scope of educational options in our area vital and expanding.

I urge the County to carefully review the proposed Forest School development plans and consider the positive impacts the school would have on our community. Thank you.

I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023). I am a member of the CBI Forest School community and a resident of the CIty of Charlottesville.

Thank you for your thoughtful consideration of this important matter. I understand that I am not a resident of Albemarle County, and that my opinion may not be of particular interest to you. But as you know, it is the combination of Charlottesville and Albemarle County that makes this little pocket of the world such a special place to live. People living in the County benefit from the industry and services the City offers, and the County offers incredible access to nature and industries unavailable to the City. I think you would agree that the City and the Country rise and fall together, and truly, we are one community.

There is a near crisis in childcare for families in the City and County. There are so so so so few daycares that accept infants (even CBI doesn't), and most preschools don't start until 2.5 to 3 years old. And many of those options do not offer full day care. CBI begins enrollment at 18 months and has an optional after hours program. Let me assure you that every additional day a family has reliable, loving childcare that they feel good about matters. We sent our daughter to a childcare just south of town before we could transfer over to CBI, and it was a mess! Individuals were lovely, but the institution was a total failure. CBI

is completely different. The CBI administration and community supports their teachers, parents, and the children. It is exactly the sort of place any family (of any religion) would want to send their small child. I know that Charlottesville and the County pride themselves as a place that supports young families. Granting this special permit is one way you can do that.

Let me reassure you, CBI, and the CBI Forest School is a Community (capital "C") in all of the best ways. Everyone is attentive to and considerate of the needs of others. It's a value of the school. I understand it is unusual to have a school in a residential neighborhood, and I understand the fears that it may create traffic issues or water issues. But the CBI treads lightly everywhere it goes- the considerate, leave no trace philosophy of the school, has allowed it to adapt from an indoor pre-school, to a summer camp, to MACAA, and now hopefully to Dudley Mountain. Of course, the whole point of the permit is to have a permanent home. But these are not outsiders whose goal is to trample on the area and leave its mark without regard for others. The CBI Forest School is made up of young, thoughtful families, who value everyone and everything around them. I know that if you grant this permit, our current community will work closely with (our hopefully future) community to address any concerns or practical hiccups that may come up along the way. You couldn't ask for a better partner.

Dear Planning Commission Members:

As the owner of the property at 1644 Dudley Mountain Rd directly adjacent to the proposed development site, I am writing to express my strong opposition to the special use permit application for SP202400023 Congregation Beth Israel (CBI) Forest School on Dudley Mountain Rd.

While I share the concerns about traffic and water impacts that have been raised by other neighbors, I wish to highlight additional significant issues specific to my property:

- 1. **Proximity and Visual Impact**: Despite the parcel being 165 acres, due to steep slopes and required setbacks, the applicant has approximately 6 acres of buildable land. This constraint has resulted in proposed structures being placed just 50 feet from my property line and 200 feet from my dwelling. This placement would create a significant visual intrusion and diminish my property's value and my enjoyment of it.
- 2. **Interference with Legal Property Use**: The proposed development's proximity to my property line would prevent me from legally hunting on my own land due to Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources setback requirements. This represents a substantial infringement on my property rights and traditional rural land use.
- 3. **Inconsistency with Rural Character**: The concentration of development so close to property boundaries is inconsistent with the rural character of our area and conflicts with the comprehensive plan's vision for this portion of Albemarle County.

I respectfully request that the Planning Commission deny this special use permit application or, at minimum, require substantial modifications to increase setbacks from neighboring properties.

My name is Rebecca Pilipowskyj and I live in the Rivanna district of Albemarle County. I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I have been a teacher at CBIFS for three years. This is the first year where most of my class (8/10 students) has been part of the CBIFS, and previously, the preschool downtown, since they were roughly two years old. My team partner and I asked them to share what Forest School means to them and to explain to the board why we need CBIFS to continue. The statements below have only been manipulated for clarity. They otherwise are only the words of the individual student.

"CBI Forest School appreciates your uniqueness. They understand how you feel and when you need help and support. Like when you need help in reading, math, writing, and like when you need help in learning knots and paw prints," Macsen, 3rd grade.

"People understand my learning differences at CBI Forest School. At public school people didn't know, including myself, that I had a learning difference. When I got to CBIFS, Debroah and Sarah [teachers] really helped me learn how to read and write. It feels nice that teachers and students understand and help me. CBIFS understands and will help students with learning diffrecnesreadn, write, and do math," Noah, 3rd grade.

"Hi, I'm Ethan and I don't think CBIFS is just another private school. I think it's awesome because you can get a Jewish focus. CBI is not a place where your [home] religion matters. Christian or not, we do Jewish Studies so we can learn about Purim, Hanukkah, and Shabbat," Ethan, 3rd Grade.

"It's nice to learn outdoors. We learn how to make fires. If there wasn't a forest school in the county, then we will have to find a new school. This is why the Albemarle Board of Supervisors should allow the Forest School to be in the County," Miles, 4th Grade.

"At CBI Forest School I get to know most people in the school. In most schools you get to see the grade below you once or twice a month. I think littler kids should get to see the older kids. For example, the small kids get to see the big kids. Not too long ago we played BINGO with the four and five year olds and it was amazingly fun! CBI teaches good manners to little kids so it is easy to talk to them. For these reasons I think it is great to have a forest school like this," Evan, 3rd Grade. "Forest school is a private school, but a private school with weekly and annual events. We have Shabbat every Friday. It's so fun and we get challah! We have an annual Hanukkah party every year. You can light the menorah and celebrate this Jewish holiday [as a school]. We have one more annual celebration. It is Purim. We get to wear costumes and heat Hamentashen! That's why Forest school is like no other school!" Jeremy, 3rd Grade.

"At CBI Forest School you get to know pretty much everyone. Teachers know when I need help. For example, when I get stuck on a project one of the teachers help me. Another example is when they make things fun and easy like math instead of it being like 39 x 7, it is like there are 39 cookies in each box, there are 7 boxes," Theodore, 3rd Grade.

"CBI helps me because I get to learn about Judaism and Hebrew most days. I've learned about Passover [including] Moses and Pharaoh from [my teacher] Haya. The Hanukkah story, too. Now I can tell you the story of Hanukkah. I learned Hebrew so I can talk to people in another language. Learning Hebrew and about Judaism helps me with my Bar Mitzvah," Yona, 4th Grade.

"Forest school appreciates and gives me unique skill sets. I have learned how to build four different fires, TP, log cabin, lean to, and sasagrill. I can build different shelters and tools. So those are some skill sets that I have and have learned at CBI Forest School," Sev, 4th Grade.

"CBI Forest School is important to me because you know all the teachers and people in your class. If you're there for a little while, you might know a bunch of kids in the school. If you know the teachers in your classroom, you might feel better asking questions because you know their names. If you know your classmates' names, you can talk to them mfore. That's why I think the Forest School is the best for knowing people there," Henry, 3rd Grade..

I urge the County to carefully review the proposed Jewish Forest School development plans and consider the positive impacts on our current and future students. The statements above are not those of parents or involved adults, but the students we have served for several years. We appreciate your consideration in helping them and future students to continue their educational journeys in the school they love.

Dear Albemarle County Planning Commissioners,

I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road. I have lived in this community for almost 25 years, am a member of Congregation Beth Israel (CBI), and a professor at UVA. During my time here, the Jewish community has had only one home – a small synagogue in downtown Charlottesville. That home is too small to accommodate a growing community and the expanding needs of its youngest members. To survive and thrive, a religious community needs to educate its children. And because Charlottesville is mostly built out, the best location for a school and camp is invariably in the county.

The Dudley Mountain road site is exceptionally well-suited for a school. The proposed use is not dense and is designed as a campus, in harmony with surrounding nature. And the conservation easement will preserve many acres for green space, while also allowing for a school that can serve the county's burgeoning pre-school age population – a much needed resource for those in our community. Neighbors tend to be understandably concerned about effects on their property of a new development. But this school is fairly low impact compared to other uses that could be contemplated for this tract of land. CBI is a good neighbor in its downtown location and will be a good neighbor in the county.

I should also note that this is a religious school, which has special significance. Federal law provides unique constitutional treatment for religious land uses, pursuant to the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA) and the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The reasons for this are well

established: Religious institutions are both uniquely valuable as a civic matter and are uniquely vulnerable to discrimination.

As already noted, the small synagogue that has served this community since the late 1800s has protected and fostered a robust Jewish community for close to 150 years. Making it possible for that community to grow while giving due attention to the county's need for protected green space is a great policy win overall.

I appreciate your attention to this matter and look forward to the county's decision.

This is the only full-time Jewish nature based school in the country and the largest nature based preschool in Virginia. In 2022, Director Jill Abbey-Clark won a prestigious Covenant Award for Jewish educators, honoring innovation and dedication to education and the development of children in an ever changing world.

As the largest forest preschool in the area, CBI Forest School offers children the outdoors as a springboard to inquiry and development. By using a nature based curriculum, children become stewards of the land while also growing with the rhythms of their natural development. Children develop skills such as agency, resilience, independence, flexibility, empathy, intention and cooperation by engaging in outdoor activities.

As is well-documented, the Charlottesville-Albemarle region has a far greater demand for early childhood education than there are slots. The Forest School currently has 60 slots for children aged 18 months-4 years. I was raised in Albemarle and currently have two children who attend the CBI Forrest School. I am a doctor (pediatric infectious diseases) and work at UVA. I am writing to support the Dudley Mountain Rd. special use permit for CBI to build a permanent campus at that site.

When my wife and I moved back to Charlottesville, we were not looking for a school for our two children (aged 3 and 5) that would foster their ability to stand on their own feet, develop their resilience, and teach them to respect their peers and the earth in addition to reading, math, science, etc. We chose CBI for these reasons rather than the Jewish education. Over the last two years we have seen our children grow up in the woods. They pick up trash when they see it, they remark on erosion where they see it, they are thoughtful about pollution, recycling, and gardening/planting. They understand where their food comes from and understand their choices influence the earth and those around them. This style of teaching is unequivocally good for children.

Albemarle clearly has a need for more childhood education options. My name is Hannah Pearce and I live in Albemarle County, and our family has been members of Congregation Beth Israel since 2000! All 4 of our children attended Sunday and Wednesday school there and had their bar/bat mitzvahs there as well. CBI is a wonderful place for Jewish and non-Jewish people to meet, worship, learn, celebrate holidays, and more.

The Forest School currently serves 100 Jewish and non-Jewish students from 18 months of age through 4th grade - but they can no longer reside at Camp Holiday Trails (actually they are at a different temporary location now). They have received a donation of land of 155 acres on Dudley Mountain Road but are applying for a Special Use Permit (SP202400023) because it is zoned as rural. This would be a permanent location for the school and would allow it to serve 144 students! If they cannot use this land then the Forest School would have to dissolve, which would be unfortunate (to lose those spots for students especially when the need for educational programs is growing).

I also volunteer at the Botanical Garden of the Piedmont, where I give tours, and nature walks to adults and school children. I see the children's eyes light up when they encounter a new plant or touch rough tree bark. I commend Albemarle County for the attention to the needs of its inhabitants. I moved here 6 years ago and feel so lucky that I chose this area.

The Forest School was starting during Covid to keep educating our children outside and avoid the spread of Covid. It was found to be such an amazing way to educate children, capture their imaginations and expose them to the nature that so many of them are missing in their previous daily lives. That is why they choose to keep the school running after Covid restrictions ended.

I am writing as both as a member of the county, the Jewish community, and a member of the CBI Forest School community. CBI Forest School is deeply committed to the protection of the natural environment. Through a conservation easement as a part of its acquisition of the Dudley Mountain Road property, CBIFS will maintain the wilderness of this area of Albemarle County in perpetuity.

They take the concerns of the neighbors seriously. CBI is considering incorporating rainwater catchment into our non-potable water uses, such as flushing toilets and watering plants. They also plan to install low-flow fixtures that will minimize our water use.

Thank you for reading this letter. I am a longtime Charlottesville resident writing in support of the proposed Jewish Forest School development plans (Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for the CBI Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023). The main perspective that I can offer here is personal. My daughter attended the CBI Forest school for two years when it was at Camp Holiday Trails (for 3rd and 4th grades) and before that she attended the preschool when it was located in downtown Charlottesville. CBI Forest school was absolutely transformative for her-- and, I'd add, for our family. It nourished all of our connection to the natural world. It would be wonderful for many other area children and their families to grow up with a sense of gratitude and wonder toward nature (and more straightforward learning about ecology) that CBI provides.

I understand and appreciate the legitimate concerns of neighbors on Dudley Mountain road. But I do believe, based on my experience with CBI, that it will be a good neighbor (especially if, as I understand is the plan, it institutes a shuttle from downtown!). I also think that there will be a lot of knock-on good effects of CBI being able to continue as a forest school for our region overall: teachers who work there will share their knowledge with educators, kids who go to preschool there will fan out into other nature-based programs, parents will support nature-based learning in public schools, etc. I am a political theory professor, and so I can't

help but add that it is good to have what John Stuart Mill called "experiments in living" from which all of us can learn. Not to mention that, from what I understand, having the school on this property would be preferable, on water and land-use dimensions, than having four large houses there.

I am an Albemarle County resident living at 103 Vicar Court, and I am writing to voice my support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

Born and raised in Charlottesville, I have roots here, and am raising my own family in this community where our four-year-old son attends Congregation Beth Israel's Forest School at its current temporary location. Professionally, I am a trained landscape historian and work in the field of landscape preservation for historic sites (see projects with Liz Sargent HLA and Trace Collaborative), a field that necessitates consideration of environmental, cultural, and historic conditions for planning purposes. I am thus familiar with and sensitive to the myriad land use issues and dilemmas that inform decisions around development and planning. While I am sympathetic to the concerns of Dudley Mountain residents, I know the plans for CBI's Forest School would be appropriately sensitive to preserving the valuable rural character and natural resources of both Dudley Mountain Road and the site itself. I am also confident that the CBI Forest School would prove an exceptional neighbor for local residents, one that stands by its word and holds dear its core values of community and being "present in the wilderness."

As a parent, I can attest to the incredible foundation an early childhood education based in the natural world can offer. Our son, a pandemic baby, is quiet, kind, and observant. He has truly blossomed during his nearly two years at the CBI Forest School. Given a dried leaf, he can name the tree species. He comes home spouting earthworm facts. He doesn't bat an eye at rainy weather. He climbs logs and identifies mycelium. He picks flowers to bring home to our family and collects rocks and bark to stuff to place on his dresser "for decoration," as he says. He can help his friends remove ticks and scramble up boulders. What I'm trying to say is that the CBI Forest School has taught him and friends to love, care for, and be curious about the natural world in an era when screens and sedentary activities dominate our lives. Imagine this curiosity, care, and knowledge scaled to the site of Dudley Mountain Road. Imagine the children that such a school could send out into the world one day: These are children I know and want to know. They are eventual adults I want out there helping to steward the land and environment for the generations to come.

As a final thought, I'd like to say another word about the idea of "community" that defines the CBI Forest School experience. Neither my husband nor I are Jewish and I personally have never gravitated towards organized "community." The Forest School has taught and showed me the joy and support that such community can offer. The sense of belonging and community that has buoyed our young son's confidence and engagement with the world is something I have felt myself as a CBI Forest School parent over the past two years. It is a community that is powerful in its joy, generosity, and friendship; it makes people -- and places -- better for knowing it.

I hope these words provide some insight into the value of a place and community that is so difficult to summarize in the context of a letter like this. Thank you for reading and for your consideration.

My name is Cameron Hardesty, and I am the mother of a current Congregation Beth Israel Forest School (CBIFS) student and a future student enrolling Fall 2025. I live in the Rio district of Albemarle County, and I am writing in support of CBIFS receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for the school at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

My family moved to Charlottesville in January 2023 from Washington, D.C., seeking a safe, peaceful childhood for our daughter. My parents' retirement to Albemarle County sealed our decision, and we relocated not just our home, but also my business—Poppy, a venture-backed wedding tech startup—bringing jobs and investment to Virginia. In 2024, I was honored to be named the Charlottesville Business Innovation Council's Entrepreneur of the Year.

One of the biggest challenges we faced upon moving was **childcare**. Waitlists at preschools stretched for years. Nanny shares fell through. Then we discovered CBIFS—a school that felt almost miraculous. A place where children play, learn, and thrive under the care of visionary educators and a deeply committed community. It quickly became not only a lifeline for us as working parents but also the heart of our new life in Charlottesville.

If this permit is denied, CBIFS cannot continue. That would be a **tremendous loss**, not just for families like ours, but for Albemarle County—a place that desperately needs more high-quality childcare, particularly for the youngest pre-schoolers, which comprises the majority of CBIFS' student body.

The donated land on Dudley Mountain was a beacon of hope. The opposition from neighbors has been discouraging, but I believe those against the school do not yet realize what a gift CBIFS is—not only to its families and the Jewish community, but to the conservation of the land, and to the county itself.

Charlottesville is growing, and families like mine are eager to put down roots and contribute to this community's economic and civic future. But we cannot do that without **childcare solutions**.

I urge the County to carefully review the proposed CBI Forest School development and give this school a chance to continue making a profound impact on local families.

Thank you for your time and consideration. If you can, I encourage you to visit the school and see firsthand the extraordinary community you have the power to preserve.

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Dear Members of the Albemarle County Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission,

My name is Kate Donowitz and I live in the White Hall district of Albemarle County. I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I urge the County to carefully review the proposed Jewish Forest School development plans and consider the positive impacts on our community.

I grew up in Charlottesville and currently practice as a pediatrician at the University of Virginia. I am the parent of two young children. I see the impact of kids' educational experiences on their physical and mental health every single day, both at work and at home. Children and families face so many challenges to their physical and mental well-being in today's world. We have observed a phenomenal increase in mental health problems in our adolescent population over the last 5-10 years. Patients I meet

every day in clinic or in the hospital tell me that they feel anxious, socially isolated, and crushed by academic pressure without a clear sense of purpose.

As I struggle to help my adolescent patients face these problems, I also spend a lot of time thinking about how to prepare my younger patients and my own children for these challenges. Common sense tells us that early educational experiences can change the trajectory of a child's life, but an abundance of scientific data also support this assertion. Outdoor education has shown particular benefits for both physical and mental health in children. Nature-specific outdoor learning increases student engagement and ownership of learning (1), supports better stress regulation and brain development (2), and fosters a more cooperative learning environment (3).

Unfortunately, we also know that most kids are spending far more time in front of screens than they are outside. A recent study found that the average 3-year old spends 150 minutes in front of a screen every day (4). Increased exposure to television at this age has been associated with worse outcomes by 4th grade (worse academic performance, negative psychosocial outcomes, and increased body max index) (5). Increased use of digital technology is associated with higher rates of depressive symptoms in adolescents (6). While screens and technology are part of modern life, excessive exposure to these tools has clear negative effects on children of all ages.

Access to outdoor educational experiences is vital to cultivating curiosity, resilience, self-efficacy, and joy in our children. These conclusions are supported by data, and by my personal experience as pediatrician and a parent. CBI Forest School and outdoor educational programs like it can help us to raise healthier individuals, who in turn contribute to the creation of better communities. I strongly believe that outdoor education is one solution to the growing challenges we face in our children's mental and physical health. I urge you to support the development of this project not only for the families who benefit directly, but for the benefit of our Charlottesville community and for our society as a whole.

The price for this will, of course, be some additional traffic on Dudley Mountain Road, which will inconvenience the neighbors. Having experienced pickup and drop-off at CBI with my child, I know the CBI staff runs it as safely and efficiently as possible.

I urge the County to approve the CBI Forest School's application. While it may add a few minutes the neighbors' commutes, this opportunity to increase the availability of childcare is just too important for the wider community to pass up.

I am an Albemarle County resident living at 6103 Indian Ridge Drive, Earlysville VA 22936, and I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I am a father and grandfather with a more than 30 year history with CBI. My daughter is a teacher in the Forest School and my grandsons are graduates of the program with one still attending. I am also a physician and emeritus UVA Faculty member and educator. So I come at this issue not only from the perspective of family and what is best for children, but as someone with decades of medical and educational experience.

To the main point: The Congregation Beth Israel Forest School (CBIFS) is and was, a brilliant innovation at a time of extreme need for such a program. I witnessed first hand the amazing effectiveness of this program and continue to see it transform children in so many positive ways. I witnessed this with my own grandsons. Originally a bit bug-o-phobic these guys are now expert entomologists botanists, tree climbers, hikers, campers, etc and they are also extremely well schooled in reading writing, math, science and culture. My oldest grandson has transitioned back to 5th grade at Crozet elementary and I know for a fact he was extremely well prepared socially, physically and academically compared to his peers who did not have the CBIFS experience. Talking to many colleagues, parents and friends, he is not alone. The combination of real world interaction in a healthful outdoor environment that promotes physical analytical and emotional development and resileince, compared to the traditional "sit at desk and listen" environment of our typical public schools, has left me fully convinced as an educator, that the model developed at CBIFS is absolutely the best way to educate young children through their pre-school and elementary school years. This opinion applies no matter what external factors are present, i.e pandemic or normal times. The CBIFS way is in my considered opinion, simply better and it critically enhances the educational options available for children in Albemarle County. I only wish the approach could be generalized to all elementary schools.

The problem of course, is that the extremely successful CBIFS now desperately needs a permanent home. It could and should have one at the generously available Dudley Mountain Road site. The loss to children of Albemarle County if CBIFS cannot continue to do what is has so well done, namely produce resilient, well educated and culturally sensitive children in its special way, would be extremely unfortunate. I know that CBIFS will be excellent neighbors and that any minor negatives of their small footprint on this large rural site are far out balanced by the many positives presented by this proposal.

I live in the Biscuit Run area / Scottsville District of Albemarle County, off Old Lynchburg Rd and just a short drive from Dudley Mountain Road. I've lived in the Charlottesville area for nearly 20 years, with the majority of my time spent living on this side of town south of UVA and the Downtown Mall.

This area has certainly seen a lot of growth and change in the time that I've been living here, but I'm proud that the decision makers in this community care about projects that increase the quality of life for our neighbors and our community. The Wegmans development brought quality groceries and other amenities to this side of town. The new Southwood development has expanded housing opportunities for those in our community at a variety of income levels. And I'm delighted to see that Congregation Beth Israel's Forest School has been offered an opportunity to build a permanent home for their innovative program on this side of our town.

For nearly 15 years, I have worked as a school teacher and administrator (not at the Forest School) in Charlottesville. I have had the opportunity to tour the Forest School as a professional peer, and I have been impressed with the quality of the program, the dedication and professionalism of the staff, and the school's unique commitment to teaching the importance of respecting and preserving wilderness – a true "Leave No Trace" ethos. Importantly, the school also allows Jewish families in Charlottesville a unique opportunity to enroll their children in a school environment that celebrates their heritage and cultural traditions. It is impossible to overstate the value of this resource, especially in this community.

The story of the Forest School is truly inspiring: there are few programs like it nationwide. When Covid hit, their program was forced to "think outside the box", and what resulted is a highly innovative model for early education based in Jewish values and outdoor education. My name is Andrew Mondschein. I am writing in support of Congregation Beth Israel receiving a Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for its Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023).

I am a member of Congregation Beth Israel, and my youngest child attended the CBI Forest School for four years while it was located at Camp Holiday Trails. I am also a transportation planner, certified by the American Institute of Certified Planners, and an Associate Professor of Urban and Environmental Planning at the University of Virginia. I write this letter as a member of the CBI community and the local community (as a Charlottesville resident), but my perspective is shaped by my experience as a transportation planner and educator.

I deeply respect the expertise, diligence, and care that the County's planners have given this application, and they have been thorough and thoughtful in their review. I also completely understand the importance of traffic safety. What I do hope you will consider is that there are two approaches to reducing risks on any right-of-way: infrastructural and operational.

Dudley Mountain Road will not be widened or improved in the near future, but risks can still be reduced by establishing clear practices for how the road will be used to reduce potential conflicts. The Forest School has already proposed a wide range of options for reducing operational conflicts on Dudley Mountain Road to your staff. By staggering the time and manner by which children arrive at the School, the possibility of conflicts can be significantly reduced. The details of these options have been presented and discussed with staff.

Staff has acknowledged that these types of operational approaches could work but have not so far endorsed them for approval of this permit. While this type of operational approach may not work uses or permittees, I strongly believe that the Forest School would be an ideal case. The School is relatively small and run by leadership who have demonstrated their ability to flexibly and safely operate a school in nature, including at the end of the dirt road that was Reservoir Road for four years. The County's flexibility during the COVID emergency allowed the Forest School to operate off of a rural road, and it demonstrated that this is a School and community that can work responsibly and accountably with government to create a unique experience for community, County, and region.

Principally, I believe that the Forest School has presented the County with well-considered options for reducing conflicts along Dudley Mountain Road that will have quantitatively demonstrable benefits for traffic safety, while also allowing a truly unique school, with no existing parallel in the region, to support its community and the County. The planners have been very thoughtful about reducing the risks of access, but I ask that you encourage them to work with Forest School to optimize and accept the types of operational approaches that the school is ready and fully capable of implementing.

I am writing with public comment opposing the special use permit requested by CBI.

Throughout CBI's proposal to build their Forest School, they emphasize the importance of minimizing their footprint on the existing environment, nature, the natural landscape, and the ecosystem. Their stated desire is in direct contradiction to their proposal.

The parcel of land they seek to build upon is zoned for a family home, at most multiple single-family houses. Their proposal would vastly increase the number of buildings on the property, but even more significantly, their proposal would wipe out the natural water source shared with widespread neighbors, greatly multiply the human waste poured into the surrounding woodland, devastate the rural road already in poor condition, and exponentially increase the traffic creating a danger to every local driver.

The revised proposal does not address these issues.

To make the road safe for hundreds more cars each day, Dudley Mountain Rd would need to be widened and lined, with potholes filled in and drainpipes reinforced, and the speed limit lowered. Our road is currently used for biking, running, and walking dogs. It is a curving, narrow, unforgiving road that has washed out in heavy rain, been blocked by fallen trees multiple times a year, has deer and a multitude of wild animals crossing it, and is rarely plowed in snow. More cars means more accidents and more accidents means more danger for every resident on Dudley Mountain Rd.

The sprinkler systems required for safety in the school buildings would lower the water table to such an extreme that neighbors would go without water. This is already a problem during summer and fall droughts for many on our road. CBI member, Dave Weiss, shared that the lowering water table is already an issue in Whittington, just behind the parcel of land, and that several homes have been unable to retrieve water from wells for their homes. As residents of Dudley Mountain Rd, we don't have other options for drinking water and household plumbing. Our only option is well water and we rely on our neighbors to be good stewards of this natural resource. The Forest School would drain this resource to the detriment of all of us.

I also continue to be gravely concerned about sending young children into the woods of our neighborhood to explore, hike, read, and write, when our woods are full of hunters. We do not venture into the woods on our own property during hunting season for this reason.

The goal of the Forest School is a great one but it should be built on property zoned for a business or school.

I strongly urge that the Forest School proposal be declined.

Apologies for getting this in "under the wire". I've reviewed the resubmittal documentation for SP202400023. My wife and I are Dudley Mountain Road residents, and although I haven't commented previously, I have been following this case closely and would like to provide feedback on the resubmitted materials:

- 1. Based on the tabulation of feedback provided at the end of Line and Grade's comment responses, two of the most common concerns voiced by the community have to do with road maintenance and traffic volume along what one of the Planning reviewers describes as this "narrow and windy road". It does not appear that anything in the applicant's resubmission addresses this issue in a substantive way. Instead, the applicant suggests that they are "open to" expanding the dropoff and pickup windows, they're "open to trying" a shuttle from town, and they will join with neighbors to lobby the County and VDOT for increased road maintenance. Beyond being vague, these promises will be impossible for the County (or anyone else) to enforce, once construction is complete. What if families don't like the distributed dropoff plan? What if no one wants to use the shuttle? What if additional VDOT maintenance funding can't be secured? Operational measures assuming they're even being followed can do little to lessen the impact of a 130-student school and 200-person multipurpose building on such a narrow, low-density road. If the applicant intends to widen and improve all of Dudley Mountain Road as part of their project, the neighborhood would likely be more receptive. As it is, this project is unquestionably making an already bad road situation worse.
- 2. In response to one of Scott Clark's comments, the applicant states that this project supports the Rural Area goals, because "childcare/schooling is a necessity in any location and directly supports the surrounding community as it is open to all". This argument would be stronger if the proposed school was a public one, serving this specific section of the County. As a private school open only to those fortunate enough to afford the tuition, it is difficult to see how the full surrounding community is served. If the applicant has any documentation that the school currently enrolls students from Dudley Mountain Road, I would imagine the neighborhood would be interested to see it. In absence of any data, it is easy to believe that many if not most of the working families living along Dudley Mountain Road cannot afford to send their children to this school.







Mr. Shoaf,

I am writing to express our strong opposition to the proposed Special Use Permit for the CBI School on Dudley Mountain Road. As a landowner for over 25 years and a current resident of the adjacent property, we am deeply concerned about the potential negative impacts this project could have on our land. These concerns include the **infringement on private rights**, a significant decrease in property value, and the loss of hunting and other recreational activities.

This area is characterized by low population density due to the larger parcels of land and offers abundant natural resources and stunning views for the community to enjoy. Permitting this development would encroach upon an otherwise rural area and disrupt the tranquil, rural environment that currently exists.

Additionally, we have some concerns regarding the following:

Traffic Congestion: The proposed development will significantly increase traffic on Dudley Mountain Road. This road is narrow, curvy, and in poor condition, which creates safety hazards for both residents and bicyclists. I am also concerned about the safety of children and their families who travel to and from the school daily. Furthermore, the application provides a poor estimate of the number of vehicular trips per day. I am uncertain how the calculation of 140 students and 28 staff results in only 109 trips. Even if this is the current estimate, those trips are likely to change from year to year and could increase if the school expands. A more accurate estimate would be closer to 400 trips, not including larger vehicles for trash collection, cleaning, supplies, and other deliveries.

In addition, traffic on roads leading to Dudley Mountain Road also are strained and in poor condition. A good example would be an event held last year at Forest Lodge on Old Lynchburg Road which created a 1 mile back up and traffic was at a standstill for over 45 minutes.

Environmental Concerns: The proposal indicates that EMS plans to use the creek as a water supply. As a long-time resident, I firmly believe that this creek does not provide a sufficient water source for emergency services. We are aware of the limited water supply in our area, often experiencing days without water. The Line & Grade report further supports this, noting that the water output for four parcels around the proposed development is poor. Approving this large development would place additional strain on the water supply. If the water supply were to dry up for neighbors, who would be held responsible — the County or CBI?

Furthermore, as a rural residential community, this development would introduce light and noise pollution from the school. In addition to regular school activities, the facility would be approved to host events for up to 200 people at any time, further increasing the light and noise neighbors would have to experience.

Community Disruption: The construction process is expected to create significant noise and disruption in our daily lives for an extended period, which would negatively affect the quality of life for residents in the area. Additionally, we are concerned about runoff from the construction impacting our property.

I strongly urge the Planning Commission to carefully review the potential negative impacts of this project and find a more appropriate home for the CBI school. I believe that approving this proposal would not be in the best interest of the Dudley Mountain Road community.

I am writing to express concerns of mine and my family regarding the proposal (SP202400023) for the CBI Forest School and the associated developments on Dudley Mountain Road. As a homeowner and resident of this community on Dudley mountain Road, I believe that this proposal poses several significant issues that need to be addressed before any further consideration.

Firstly, apart from a slight uptick during the morning and afternoon commute, Dudley Mountain Road is a chamingl and relatively quiet rural route. The CBI Forest School would generate several hundred additional traffic trips on Dudley Mountain Road, resulting in an exponential increase in traffic. This surge in traffic would lead to unmanageable peak times during the morning and afternoon commutes, causing severe congestion and delays for all road users, not even including the unscheduled mid-day rushes to the school.

Secondly, the increased traffic would create substantial safety risks on this already hazardous and deteriorating roadway. The ditches have not been maintained or serviced by VDOT in years, and are already overwhelmed with the runoff from heavy precipitation. The safety of drivers, pedestrians, and the many bicyclists who use Dudley Mountain Road on a regular basis would be compromised, leading to a higher likelihood of accidents and injuries.

Moreover, the proposed school campus and the large future assembly building would be the first non-agricultural or residential use on Dudley Mountain Road. Subject: Opposition to SP202400023 Proposal to Rezone on Dudley Mountain Road

My name is Adam Southall and I live on Masseys Woods Road off of Dudley Mountain Road. I am writing to express my deep concern and opposition to the private school being proposed on Dudley Mountain Road. I am opposed to the current request to rezone for the school as it creates a safety and ecological problem.

This school will bring an increase in traffic to Dudley Mountain Road. The road itself is narrow, curvy, not lined, and is already crumbling in areas. The current proposal would see a tremendous increase in expected traffic further leading to the degradation of the road and a higher risk of traffic accident or property damage. As it is, Albemarle County School Busses and large trucks have to pull to the side to allow passenger cars to pass at certain points in the road. Regular sized passenger vehicles have to occasionally pull to the side to allow other vehicles to pass safely as parts of the road narrow and some edges are crumbling. Additionally, the intersection at Dudley Mountain Road and Old Lynchburg is not equipped for the massive increase in traffic that will be turning both onto and off of Dudley Mountain Road. Adding the proposed increase in traffic will lead to a dangerous traffic pattern in a small rural community for which the closest EMS services are back in the city. Dudley Mountain Road will immediately become one of the most dangerous rural roads in the county as a result of the volume increase in traffic and inadequate planning to support that traffic.

My other concern for the proposed school is the demand on water in our neighborhood. Every home in our neighborhood relies on a well for water resources. The current proposal calls for several thousand gallons of water to be pulled from the ground for the school on a weekly basis. The neighboring homes already see periods of dry wells and low water pressure as a result of falling water table levels. The increase in demand placed on water reserves by the school will make neighboring wells untenable. Additionally, the natural ecosystem of our mountain community relies on a water reserve to maintain our plants and animals. The depletion of water to fulfill the water needs of the school will result in severe damage to the local ecosystem. Adjacent to the property are two creek beds that routinely run dry during dry spells. Pulling further water from the ground to fulfill the needs of the school will result in both water sources being left depleted and environmental damage.

I am opposed to rezoning our community to support this plan, and I ask that you oppose this request on ecological and safety grounds.

I lived across from the Memphis Hebrew Academy in Memphis in the late 80's and 90's, and they were great neighbors.

Here are my issues:

- CBI Forest School would generate over 573 additional traffic trips on Dudley Mountain Road a 400% increase of traffic with unmanageable peak times during the morning and afternoon commutes
- Increased traffic would create substantial safety risks on this hazardous and deteriorating roadway - endangering drivers, pedestrians, and the many bicyclists who use Dudley Mountain Road
- This school campus, and the large proposed future religious assembly building, would be the first non-agricultural or residential use on all of Dudley Mountain Road.
- CBI has failed, and will not, complete the necessary groundwater tests to ensure/protect their neighbor's water supply and the supply for the area neighbors. They have also not secured or adequately pursued the conservation easement they claim will protect the unused portion of this property
- The application calls for regular events of up to 200 people and future religious gatherings without providing adequate parking, transportation infrastructure, or emergency services. While the applicants say that the use will be limited, we all know that will not be true in the long term.

I am writing to express our strong opposition to the proposed Special Use Permit for the CBI School on Dudley Mountain Road. As a landowner for over 25 years and a current resident of the adjacent property, we am deeply concerned about the potential negative impacts this project could have on our land. These concerns include the **infringement on private rights**, a significant decrease in property value, and the loss of hunting and other recreational activities.

This area is characterized by low population density due to the larger parcels of land and offers abundant natural resources and stunning views for the community to enjoy. Permitting this development would encroach upon an otherwise rural area and disrupt the tranquil, rural environment that currently exists.

Additionally, we have some concerns regarding the following:

Traffic Congestion: The proposed development will significantly increase traffic on Dudley Mountain Road. This road is narrow, curvy, and in poor condition, which creates safety hazards for both residents and bicyclists. I am also concerned about the safety of children and their families who travel to and from the school daily. Furthermore, the application provides a poor estimate of the number of vehicular trips per day. I am uncertain how the calculation of 140 students and 28 staff results in only 109 trips. Even if this is the current estimate, those trips are likely to change from year to year and could increase if the school expands. A more accurate estimate would be closer to 400 trips, not including larger vehicles for trash collection, cleaning, supplies, and other deliveries.

In addition, traffic on roads leading to Dudley Mountain Road also are strained and in poor condition. A good example would be an event held last year at Forest Lodge on Old Lynchburg Road which created a 1 mile back up and traffic was at a standstill for over 45 minutes.

Environmental Concerns: The proposal indicates that EMS plans to use the creek as a water supply. As a long-time resident, I firmly believe that this creek does not provide a sufficient water source for emergency services. We are aware of the limited water supply in our area, often experiencing days without water. The Line & Grade report further supports this, noting that the water output for four parcels around the proposed development is poor. Approving this large development would place additional strain on the water supply. If the water supply were to dry up for neighbors, who would be held responsible — the County or CBI?

Furthermore, as a rural residential community, this development would introduce light and noise pollution from the school. In addition to regular school activities, the facility would be approved to host events for up to 200 people at any time, further increasing the light and noise neighbors would have to experience.

Community Disruption: The construction process is expected to create significant noise and disruption in our daily lives for an extended period, which would negatively affect the quality of life for residents in the area. Additionally, we are concerned about runoff from the construction impacting our property.

I strongly urge the Planning Commission to carefully review the potential negative impacts of this project and find a more appropriate home for the CBI school. I believe that approving this proposal would not be in the best interest of the Dudley Mountain Road community.

Hi Syd,

Thanks for keeping the DMR residents up to speed on CBI's submission status and details. It appears the Community Development Dept. did a thorough job reviewing and commenting on CBI's original proposal and addressing residents' thoughts and concerns as well as County requirements. I have every confidence the County will be doing an equally excellent review of CBI's recent [Jan. 6, 2025] response/revisions.

Though I'm aware, of course, that my input is not a vital part of the County's review, I thought I'd comment on CBI's recent response. This may help in some small way by providing a resident's perspective. Would you kindly forward this to the appropriate reviewers. I certainly appreciate the County offering the opportunity for the public to contribute comments.

The following comments refer to headings and item numbers as appear in Line and Grade's January 6 letter:

Planning Comments on the Special Use Permit – Narrative and Use

5. CBI proposing to spread out the morning drop-off window to one hour will certainly not assure mitigation of peak traffic, and traffic volume still remains the same. There is also still potential for congestion. Nor does spreading out or staggering the afternoon pickup reduce overall traffic volume or potential for congestion. Also, saying that a shuttle will be offered hardly assures it will be utilized to any significant or effective degree, and the offer can easily be canceled if there is not sufficient participation.

This topic of traffic volume increase that would be created by the project is one of the greatest negatives to the area. At this point, as a [retired] civil engineer, I see no solution offered, nor likely to be, that would attenuate the significant increase in traffic that could fulfill the County requirement that a Special Use Permit compliance requires there be little discernible effect on existing traffic. Even having mandatory shuttle service for students, (which is highly unlikely), and prohibiting all vehicles during "events" on the

site, (also highly unlikely and impractical), there would still be increased traffic for buses, school staff, and facility support personnel. Having a school would, one way or another, equates to many more vehicles.

- 7. CBI dedicating a few feet of right-of-way for a few hundred lineal feet of DMR, especially with no improvement intended for that portion of the road, has very little value or significance to the 4-mile road. It is quite unlikely that widening, or any other significant improvements to this road, will be made in the foreseeable future due to many factors.
- 18.(It would be far preferable, regarding water consumption, traffic, etc., to have the property developed into 4 lots, [or even 12!], than to have the negative impact this school would create).
- 19.Does CBI's response to the question of Building Type indicate that they could choose a type <u>after</u> project approval? (It would seem that gives CBI a free hand on building types in the future).
- 20. The response is evasive in that every use of the space may not currently be planned, but could be anything once the project were approved.

Planning Comments on the Special Use Permit – Conceptual Plan

- 5. Special Exception Requests for a project that already requires a Special Use Permit should be looked at with an especially critical eye.
- 6. I might assume the County had requested internal travelway dimensions specifically to examine their lengths to check for adequacy. That has not been addressed by CBI.
- 15. An undiscovered running toilet alone [as recently experienced by my neighbor] could be a danger to a well. A facility such as a school **enhances** chances for water overuse. I implore the County to consider well water usage for this project as paramount, as a well would have a significant ongoing overall draw-down and definitely put the underground structure at risk! Disapproving this project would eliminate this real risk!

Planning Comments on how the proposal relates to the Comprehensive Plan

1. It is a contentious matter, highly arguable, that certain natural site elements

mentioned are **essential** to CBI's educational program. Though this site may offer a good educational environment, many other schools in a less rural area do quite well in utilizing alternatives such as outdoor classes in certain subjects, field trips, and other available resources that don't require having on-site waterways, flora, and fauna. This site may be desirable to CBI, but not to nearby residents who would be exposed daily to negative factors – some of high potentiality, some quite actual.

- 7. (Please refer again to my comment 15. above).
- 8. It would be highly advisable to take a close look at storm water management needs for the site. "Permeable pavers", "vegetated swales", "bio-filters", and the like are iffy when it comes to heavier runoff volumes.

Fire Rescue - Howard Lagomarsino

1. I find it very unnerving, indeed, that a very significant amount, "up to 13,000 gallons", to fill on-site cistern(s) for fire water needs (if rainwater or off-site supplier is not utilized), might be drawn from an aquifer shared by several nearby homes, including mine. (This, of course is in addition to a high daily usage). I never even use my well water to irrigate my garden. This needs a close look!

Albemarle Transportation Planning - Alberic Karina-Plun

- 1. Obviously, altering "drop-off windows" does not reduce the doubling of total traffic volume.
- 2. If CBI were to "try" a shuttle system, (which you can see their heart is not in), I believe there is little chance it would prove viable to the extent overall traffic would be significantly reduced.

Albemarle County Conservation Program – Scott Clark

1. The County is quite accurate in stating that school use in this rural area is not directly supportive of the rural area goals! CBI's disagreement is, of course, wholly prejudiced toward their own endeavors, and should, indeed, be grounds in itself for permit disapproval.

Community Meeting Comments / Emails from neighbors

- 1. **Maintenance** of DMR is not the cure for the increased traffic due to the proposed school. The road is a bituminous surface treated roadway of minimal width. VDOT is already providing periodic maintenance by way of renewed surface treatment and occasional patching and cross-drain work. It would not be viable to improve the road by widening, straightening, or constructing a more durable bituminous concrete surface due to the prohibitive expense, current residential usage, extensive existing drainage ditches, and minimal right-of-way. "Request increased road maintenance" is a ridiculous cure for doubling traffic on the road!
- 2. Neither CBI's acknowledged "concern", nor the possibility of a shuttle, nor enlarging the drop-off window combined, will alter the increased vehicle burden.
- 4. Nothing mentioned in CBI's response to this item will have any effect on the safety of bicyclists or pedestrians, nor on speeding.
- 8. Saying that the school use would not produce high noise volumes is neither credible nor convincing. (I'd rather put up with a short bout of gun shooting on occasion than screaming kids at various times of the day).
- 13.(Bullets are not real good about respecting property boundary lines).
- 15.CBI's response does not change the fact that "the proposed development does not benefit the immediate community".
- 16.A low volume "housing development" [4 houses on 4 development rights] would be greatly preferred to a school.
- 17.Of course the development of this school "is not seen [by the developer] to encourage future development along this road". The development **is simply not** compatible with the character of the area!

My humble suggestion is for the County, after this next review, to disapprove this permit request at the soonest to minimize further expense and effort by CBI, and to enable them to continue to look for an alternate site for their school.

As a constituent in the Samuel Miller District and an active member of our local community and neighborhood, I want to express my support for the approval of the Special Use Permit to build a permanent home for the Forest School at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road (SP202400023.)

I serve as a volunteer member of the Board of Directors at Congregation Beth Israel. Our goal is to continue to lead our Jewish community in Charlottesville toward healthy growth, additive community and county engagement, and to serve as responsible stewards for our next generations of Charlottesville families.

The success of the Forest School works directly toward those goals:

Strength of Education: The CBI Forest School offers the opportunity for families to engage in an innovative approach to education, celebrating the symbiosis between humans and nature. The data we have collected over the past four years highlights the benefits to students of building critical thinking and problem-solving skills while engaging in our natural environment. Additionally, research shows that learning in an environment rooted in the outdoors builds an acute awareness of natural cycles, including resilience, regrowth, and change, qualities we celebrate in our environment *and* in our young learners.

Health Benefits: The Forest School grew out of the need during Covid lockdown for more space and fresh air for healthful interaction. The wooded, expansive property on Dudley Mountain offers a vast learning ground for our students to engage in physical activity while learning. With a more clear vision of the many benefits of the Forest School model, there is growing interest in enrollment where students' cognitive and mental health skills are thriving.

Environmental Focus: As Albemarle continues to grow and expand geographically, the Forest School supports the protection of the sensitive environment around Dudley Mountain, including minimizing the built environment on the property. The school is home to environmentally-conscious families and students who are deeply committed to the preservation of local flora and

fauna, water conservation and protection behaviors, and others as they focus on their personal role in the minimal disruption of the land.

Security Benefits: As a community, we would be naïve to ignore the security challenges that have become more acute since the 2017 Unite the Right Rally during which Jews in Charlottesville were targeted for violence. With recent deadly attacks against Jews in synagogues and schools across the U.S., the privacy and discretion of the Dudley Mountain property offers much upside to the safety of our students and staff.

Despite my enthusiasm for this project, I understand the concerns by the immediate neighbors on Dudley Mountain. Any changes to a previously uninhabited property will draw natural disappointment. However, I want to reassure you, and them, that our long term interests are aligned, as evidenced by both our mission-driven goals of environmental responsibility, discreet gatherings, and engaged, civic-minded students who will comprise the next generation of Albemarle leaders. We hope to work closely and amicably with neighbors, in the near term and throughout the coming years, toward mutually beneficial goals in protecting the sanctity of our green spaces.

Thank you for your commitment to our district and county. I urge you and your peers to approve the Special Use Permit. It represents a small piece of the culture and the people that make Albemarle such an attractive community for young families.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed Special Use Permit for the CBI School (the "Forest School") on Dudley Mountain Road. I believe that neither the original submission nor the resubmitted version adequately addresses the concerns of the County and neighboring residents.

As a landowner in Albemarle County for over 25 years and a current resident of the adjacent property, I am deeply concerned about the negative impacts this development will have on our land.

Our concerns include infringement on private rights, a significant decrease in property value, the loss of hunting and other recreational activities, and potential environmental and water issues.

I have attached the letter submitted to Mr. Shoaf on November 14, 2024, shared below, which also summarizes our concerns about this application.

Although CBI attempted to address the concerns raised in their revised application, their responses are significantly biased in favor of the project and fail to adequately tackle the issues we identified. Their answers tend to be generic, relying heavily on data and statistics rather than a practical, common-sense approach. Based on the information provided, it appears they do not have a comprehensive plan for this project, and many unknowns remain. For instance, they proposed an optional shuttle service for students to help alleviate traffic concerns; however, if the shuttle is optional, it raises the question of why it is considered a viable solution at all. Additionally, they quickly rebranded the multi-purpose building as a religious assembly building since it qualified as a by-right use, without providing any specific plans for its functionality.

According to Section 33.8 of the County Code, the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors must consider four factors when reviewing and acting on an application for a special use permit. Below, I will outline each of these factors and how this project affects them:

- **1. No Substantial Detriment:** This criterion assesses whether the proposed special use will substantially detriment adjacent parcels.
- **Downzoning Effect**: The proposed use may decrease the value and usability of adjacent properties, impacting landowners without their direct consent.
- **Disruption of School Activities**: School events and activities could interfere with hunting and recreational uses of land owned by neighboring property owners. State laws may protect these activities near schools.
- Noise and Light Pollution: Increased traffic and noise, along with light pollution during nighttime hours will disrupt the quiet enjoyment of the area.
- **Neighborhood Disruption**: Their presence will create distractions within the neighborhood.
- Water Demand Issues: According to the Line & Grade report, four adjacent parcels have low water output. Although our parcel was not included in the report, we, as immediate direct neighbors, will still be significantly affected. Currently, there are days when we experience water shortages and have to find an alternative for baths, cooking, and laundry.
 - A cistern does not address the water issues. The suggestion that it may be drawn from a nearby source shared by neighbors <u>does not</u> address the issues articulated. It also doesn't articulate the water impact due to daily usage. This is a **HUGE** concern.

- The report mentions the parcels owned by Leo and Angelica Zhigilei, Rich Palmero,
 Nathan and Jennifer Charlton, and Alexander and Kathy Kurland.
- Of those, two parcels are not close to the 15-acre parcel in question but are adjacent to the upper portion that the landowner may consider for a conservation easement.
- **Environmental Concerns**: There are issues related to septic runoff and discharge that need to be addressed.
 - How have stormwater needs been addressed? The application seems void in addressing heavier run-off volumes.
- **2.** The character of the surrounding area remains unchanged. The proposed special use might alter the characteristics of both adjacent parcels and the nearby area.
- There are significant deficiencies regarding road access.
- The Virginia Department of Transportation's (VDOT) finding of "generally acceptable," as shared in the Line & Grade Report, has been misrepresented.
 - While the pavement width may not pose an issue, other factors do, including the condition of the roadway surface, which will worsen with increased traffic, and the fact that most of the road lacks a shoulder.
 - There has been a rise in mirror swipes and accidents as more traffic uses these roads as shortcuts to Route 29.
 - A bicyclist was involved in a hit-and-run incident that resulted in the loss of a finger.
 - VDOT has shared there are no plans to widen or make significant improvements to this road.
 - Simply spreading out the drop-off and pick-up windows does not address these concerns. There are no options that would void the increase in traffic that would meet the County's requirement that this has a "discernable impact on existing traffic.".
 - The proposed drop-off loop is impractical for parents of young children. Other schools exemplify this issue, as many require significant staff and traffic patrols to ensure safety and maintain a smooth flow of traffic.
 - The assumption that most individuals will adhere to the posted speed limit (35 MPH) for safety is unrealistic.
 - The number of anticipated vehicular trips is grossly underestimated, suggesting extensive carpooling is impractical.
 - Traffic volume will likely vary year-over-year depending on enrollment, so it is important to consider maximum trips instead of minimum trips (173 x 2 = 346 and 346 x 2 = 692)
 - The current footprint does not account for parking for 200 people; where would they park?
 - Is there an opportunity to expand the footprint? Could they host events that accommodate more than 200 people using the available outdoor space?
 - The additional screenings are not feasible, given the land's topography. The parcel is located in a valley between two adjacent properties, meaning both properties will overlook the development.
- **3.** Harmony Whether the proposed special use will be in harmony with the purpose and intent of this chapter, with the uses permitted by right in the district, with the applicable provisions of Section 5, and with the public health, safety, and general welfare (including equity)

- Currently, large tracts of land are zoned for agricultural and forestry use, with no development allowed.
- **4.** Consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. Whether the proposed special use will be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.
- The site is located 1.5 miles outside of the designated development area.
- If exceptions to the rules continue to be made, the rules will lose their significance, undermining regulations.
- This zoning strategy was implemented because the County of Albemarle has a plan for maintaining rural areas.
- Allowing this special use could lead to the deterioration of the rural character of the area and promote urban development.

Additionally, the Comprehensive Plan, titled "Achieving the Vision," recommends that land is rezoned for development only within designated Development Areas. Consistently following this policy in legislative actions sends a strong message to potential applicants that any requests outside of this policy will not be approved.

Moreover, the Albemarle County Land Use Law Handbook (Kamptner/March 2022) outlines five valid reasons for denying a special use permit:

Five Reasonable Grounds to Deny a Special Use

The landowner fails to meet all the requirements for the granting of the permit; even if all the requirements satisfied, the decision-maker retains authority to deny the permit if sound zoning principles justify the decision.

The proposed use is inconsistent with the comprehensive plan.

The proposed use would have adverse impacts on the character of the neighborhood.

The proposed use would have adverse impacts on roads or create a hazardous traffic situation.

The proposed use would have an adverse impact on the abutting property.

Given the reasonable grounds for denying the special use permit concerning the CBI application, I believe that all concerns can be addressed affirmatively, and therefore, this project should be denied.

While the remainder of my letter does not specify particular reasons for denying the project, I believe they are essential to consider. CBI has not been very forthcoming with information about its school, including whether it is accredited, how it recruits students, and the diversity of the student population it serves.

In their application, they claim that the school is open to all students; however, their website indicates that the majority of students (75%) are Jewish. How do they recruit students? Is it solely through word-of-mouth or only within their congregation?

They also assert that operating this school will help alleviate overcrowding in public schools, presumably in Albemarle, where they are requesting to build. However, by enrolling elementary students in a private school, public schools receive less funding per student. These students will eventually return to public middle schools, leading to an increase in enrollment for which the county has neither received funding nor planned.

Additionally, the tuition rates, ranging from \$14,000 to \$16,000 (not including after-school care), are unaffordable for most county residents considering the median income.

I also have questions regarding the school's accreditation and classification. Will the school be required to pay taxes to the county, or will it be exempt?

I understand that the County Attorney has addressed concerns with the landowner, confirming that there are no legal issues regarding his service on a County board in relation to this project. However, the landowner has networked with members of other boards, including Jim Andrews, the representative for the Samuel Miller district, while discussing the preliminary plans for this project. Mr. Andrews conveyed this to me during a phone call, in which I was trying to express our concerns.

While there may not be a legal issue, there are moral and ethical implications associated with serving on a County board. For these reasons, I believe that anyone with information regarding this project should recuse themselves from the review and approval process.

I urge the County to consider these concerns and recommend that the outcome of the next review of this special-use application be a denial of CBI's request.



Dear Albemarle County Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission,

My name is Sean Greer and I live in the Whittington neighborhood at 1636 Kendra Street with my wife, Kelly, and four children (ages 10, 8, 5, and 3), just down the road from the proposed CBI Forest School on Dudley Mountain Road. Kelly and I are jointly writing this email in strong opposition of this proposed development.

My family has lived in Whittington since May 2021, and over the past three years, we have witnessed an alarming amount of near-collisions between motorists and cyclists, in light of the windy turns on Old Lynchburg Road and Dudley Mountain Road. Motorists often travel entirely too fast once passing the new Southwood community, believing they've escaped the reach of local law enforcement on a one-lane highway, and we strongly feel it is only a matter of time before someone dies on the stretch of Old Lynchburg Road between Southwood and Dudley Mountain Road. In fact, when we first heard of this proposed development, we actually thought it was a joke, given how unconscionable it would be to place additional strain on these dangerous backroads, and so close to a shooting range.

Unless Albemarle County is willing to make significant improvements to widen Old Lynchburg Road and Dudley Mountain Road, and install a bike lane from Southwood to Walnut Creek Park, Albemarle County cannot proceed in good conscience with allowing 200+ extra trips per day down these roads. This is especially true, mindful that Biscuit Run Park is certain to bring even more motorists and cyclists down Old Lynchburg Road in the years to come, directly across from the Whittington entrance.

All it will take is one motorist texting-and-driving, or one parent rushing to drop-off or pick-up at the CBI Forest School, to take the life of someone enjoying a scenic bike ride, and sadly, the blood from that tragedy will be on the hands of Albemarle County's Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors if CBI's Forest School is not denied. If you allow the proposed

development without requiring significant investment to keep our community safe, you're guaranteeing troubles for yourselves down the line, when emails like this come to light underscoring you were properly warned by the families most familiar with these roads.

Please do not put the safety of my family, with children who will reach driving age in five years, at risk in order to accommodate a school that has plenty of other options in Albemarle County to bring their vision to fruition. The proposed school is clearly outside Albemarle County's designated growth area, and the precedent you set by approving this special-use permit would be interpreted as a invitation for future developers to continue eroding the beautiful rural nature of this area.

Our family is grateful for your service to our community, and we hope you all make the right decision to deny CBI Forest School's special-use permit request and ultimately maintain the integrity of Albemarle County's development plan and commitment to the safety of its citizens.

I am a resident of Dudley Mountain Road in North Garden writing to oppose the special use permit as requested by Congregation Beth Israel of Charlottesville for the construction of a school on the road. I have two primary reasons for my opposition.

One. Dudley Mountain Road is rural and its rural designation in the county plan would be violated by any commercial enterprise including the school. Residents chose to live on this road because of its rural character and the school would adversely affect that. If the special use permit is granted, it could set a precedent for further encroachment by commercial interests which would be highly objectionable to me and the other residents who want the rural character to remain unspoiled.

Two. In my experience DMR is curvy, undersized, and in poor condition without the school and the considerable additional traffic volume from the school would be a safety hazard. The road is already under duress by a growing residential component and growth of commercial traffic headed for Crozet and Southern Albemarle. I believe the proposed school should be at an alternate location on a straight stretch of better road where the anticipated load of traffic can be handled more safely. This would also be in the best interests of both DMR residents and student families supporting such a school.

I attended the meeting you facilitated at Walton Middle School on Nov. 19, 2024 and appreciate your desire for input from the residents who would potentially be affected. I hope you were able to gauge the overwhelming opposition present in the sizeable group in attendance. On my way home this evening I counted 50+ driveway signs advocating for no school on Dudley Mountain Road. That is a lot of signage in 3 miles of road. I feel certain there are many more residents like myself who oppose the issuance of the special use permit but are not the type to post a driveway sign. I understand that a circulating petition recommending against issuance of the permit will further demonstrate the depth of the local opposition.

I'll close by saying I appreciate that the envisioned school could be a worthy addition to the system of education in Albemarle County and the city of Charlottesville. However, I urge you to recommend that the county would be best served if the applicants find an alternate location that

does not degrade the rural character of DMR or exacerbate existing safety concerns on a narrow, winding road in poor condition.

Dear Mr Shoaf,

I wished to send this separate email to express my concern about something that was presented during the community meeting on Tuesday, November 19 by the firm working on the Special Use Permit request for the CBI Forest School.

During the presentation, the speaker deliberately gave the impression that the alternative to the Forest School is to risk large-scale development -- and that the Forest School and its easement is the least disruptive option for our community when compared to a large development or a brewery that "could move in at any time."

These comparisons are not apples to apples. A by right brewery (without special permission or a special use permit) would still have a much lower limit of vehicles per day than the proposed school, for example, making the comparison misleading. More egregious, however, was the presenter's use of a screenshot/map of a 13-lot plan and her statement that this was what could happen to the parcel in question if the natural easement or school isn't approved.

The land under consideration for the Special Use Permit can only be divided into 4 or 5 lots. Moreover, the majority of the property cannot be built on because of its steep slope or proximity to the creek, whether the natural easement is approved or not, making the argument that there will be more acres preserved under the CBI Forest School than, say, with a 4-lot residential split not as clear cut.

It's only because I had spoken with the previous owner about a proposed but never approved (as far as I know), 13-lot parcel plan a few years ago that I was able to spot that potential misrepresentation at the public meeting. Its inclusion by Line and Grade Civil Engineering on an official slide and as part of the narrative feels misleading. To me, it raises concerns about the accuracy of the firm's other representations.

The CBI Forest School project should be evaluated for its merits, rather than framed as our community's only way to avoid the kinds of large scale development that we've been seeing further into town--the kind

of development that cannot happen here yet without some significant changes to current rules. Which is, in a sense, what the Special Use Permit is trying to do here.

As this email touches on the issue of the process and not just the project itself, I am copying the general email for the Planning Commission here for visibility.

Dear Mr Shoaf,

I am writing in response to the Special Use Permit application by the CBI Forest School to allow development and gatherings on Parcell 89-64 (1647 Dudley Mountain Road). My home is on the parcel 89-63A that abuts the proposed location for the school.

Previously, I was a director at an environmental education center located on a 300-acre scenic easement in rural Maryland. Our core programming focused on providing school programs as well as day and overnight camps for children. We also regularly hosted workshops, fundraising events, seasonal festivals, corporate retreats, volunteer events, and community concerts--all to benefit our program and educate the community about the environment.

Attendance for these events ran from 20-person workshops to 150-people corporate days of service to seasonal festivals attended by 600+ people. Just as proposed in the CBI Forest School plan, there was a limit on formal parking spaces...which was easily overcome by using our fields for overflow parking.

While both the drafted plan presented by Line and Grade Civil Engineering at last week's Community Meeting clearly stated there would be an enrollment cap at 144 children and mentioned a possible 200 people attending for congregation, there was no information provided on how *many* religious or community events the school might host. I further know these events are a possibility, because the CBI Forest School's website states that they provide programming "for alumni, families, and community partners to return to the forest." With additional space and the proposed educational campus on Parcell 89-64, they would be able to expand these offerings.

If I understand the Special Use Permit rules correctly, it generally removes the caps on public attendance and the limits on events per year. In order to fairly evaluate the project, I believe it's critical for the impacted community to understand whether there are any caps in this Special Use Permit for CBI Forest School or affiliated entities regarding workshops, community partner activities, and other events and how many of those events can happen per year? How often will the proposed 200-people religious services occur?

I have concerns regarding the parcel's suitability for the proposed project, such as the narrow road and associated traffic challenges, potential strain on the local water supply, and the likelihood of disrupting the area's rural character. These will be an even bigger issue if the special permit allows (or does not prohibit) additional alumni, families, and "community partner" events.

Right now, the possibility of non-school activities do not appear to be included in any of the impact evaluations happening for this project.

I appreciate the opportunity to share my comments with you and the committee reviewing the Special Use Permit request.

Dear Syd Shoaf,

The community surrounding Dudley Mountain Road has significant concerns regarding the proposed development of a forest school for 144 students and a multi-use event center in this designated rural area. This proposal conflicts with Albemarle County's land use laws, Comprehensive Plan, and zoning principles. Additionally, it raises serious questions about safety, environmental impacts, and the long-term integrity of the rural character of the area.

Key Concerns and Conflicts

1. Contradiction with Comprehensive Plan Objectives

The Comprehensive Plan prioritizes low-impact development in rural areas to preserve natural resources, agricultural lands, and forested areas. This proposal introduces high-impact uses that conflict with these goals by increasing traffic, noise, and environmental disruption *Virginia Code § 15.2-2200*, *§ 15.2-2283*.

2. Failure to Serve the Local Community

Most students and event attendees for the proposed development are expected to travel from the City of Charlottesville rather than the surrounding rural area. This development fails to provide tangible benefits to local residents while placing the burdens of increased traffic, noise, and safety risks on the rural community where the planned development will occur.

3. Traffic Safety Risks for Cyclists and Pedestrians

Old Lynchburg Road and Dudley Mountain Road are popular, if not the most traveled, southbound routes for cyclists and pedestrians traveling from Charlottesville to access rural county roads. Increased vehicular traffic from the school and event center raises the likelihood of collisions, particularly given the narrow and winding nature of these roads.

Virginia Code § 46.2-839 requires vehicles to provide at least three feet of clearance when passing cyclists. Increased traffic will make compliance with this law nearly impossible on these roads which at times are barely a car and a half width apart, significantly heightening the risk of accidents.

A recent hit-and-run incident on Old Lynchburg Road in April 2020 highlights the existing dangers for cyclists and pedestrians in this area (29 News, April 19, 2020).

4. Inadequate Emergency Response Capabilities

The nearest volunteer fire department and emergency response teams are not adequately equipped to handle a large-scale facility like a multi-use event center and school. Delayed response times in this rural area could pose significant risks in the event of an emergency, such as a fire, medical crisis, or other incidents requiring immediate attention. The county would certainly need to assess the capacities of local responders as part of this analysis.

5. Environmental and Land Preservation Concerns

The project risks destroying natural landscapes and disrupting ecosystems, in violation of zoning principles intended to protect agricultural and forest lands. Increased human activity and infrastructure demands will further strain the area's delicate environmental balance. Although proposed as minimally invasive, and the inclusion of a conservation easement is a benefit to the environment, any and all development and increased human footprint introduces a negative consequence to the surrounding environment due to the introduction of impervious areas, pollution sources, vehicle traffic, noise, dust control, stormwater impacts, and stream health. In and of itself, this conflicts with the goal of preserving rural lands.

6. Unregulated Multi-Use Event Center

The proposed event center lacks clear restrictions on size, frequency, and purpose of use. This introduces risks of noise pollution, traffic congestion, and overuse of rural infrastructure, fundamentally altering the rural character and quality of life for local residents. The exclusion of the event center in the focal point of the proposal is misleading the community and County Officials that this is simply an outdoor, minimally invasive forest school, and nothing else. This is fundamentally misleading as a multi-use center can be used for any and all events of any size at any time or day of the week that the owner would like to employ.

Threats to the Existing Rural Character

1. Proximity to the Rivanna Rifle Club

The Rivanna Rifle Club, an active shooting range near the intersection of Old Lynchburg Road, is within earshot of the proposed site. The sounds of gunfire during active range use is already and would certainly be audible at the school and event center location, raising concerns about noise levels and the suitability of this site for a school environment. The surrounding rural properties are also utilized by owners for hunting and sport shooting year round. This is something I do not believe

the developer or current land owner is taking into account and conflicts with their mission to provide children with a serene connection to the natural environment.

2. Proximity to the Martin Marietta Quarry

The Martin Marietta Quarry, located at the southern end of Dudley Mountain Road and Red Hill Road intersection, conducts daily operations involving rock blasting, drilling, and crushing. These activities, along with heavy dump truck traffic on Dudley Mountain Road, already disrupt the area's tranquility and rural landscape. Adding a school and event center would exacerbate these impacts to a community that is already subjected to the environmental impacts of an industrial operation on its southern borders.

Procedural Concerns

1. Developer Tactics and Misleading Claims

Developers have used misleading tactics to solicit support from residents, including suggesting that alternative uses such as a brewery or a 12-household development would be "worse" for the area. These claims are unfounded and do not align with the strict regulations governing farm breweries or wineries or historical precedents for residential development on this land. At a community meeting on November 19, 2024, developers employed intimidation tactics to sway opinions, undermining transparency and trust in the public consultation process by focusing on what they believe to be worse outcomes for surrounding residents rather than focusing any attention on what benefits their development would introduce to the community. These types of justifications should not be included in the decision-making process for an exemption request as any other proposed land use would need to follow suit with a similar special use permitted exemption process.

2. Violation of Zoning Requirements

Rural zoning ordinances require that developments align with the existing character and provide substantial public benefit. This proposal fails to meet these criteria, prioritizing urban populations over local residents and introducing high-impact uses incompatible with rural zoning (*Virginia Code § 15.2-2284*).

3. Precedent for High-Impact Development

Approving this project risks setting a dangerous precedent, encouraging further commercial or non-rural developments in rural areas and jeopardizing Albemarle County's commitment to preserving its rural character.

Community Requests

Given these concerns, the community respectfully urges the Planning Commission to:

1. Deny the Proposal

Simply put, this development is incompatible with Albemarle County's land use laws, Comprehensive Plan, and zoning principles, and adequate justifications that align with exemptions to laws, plans and zoning have not been introduced to the public or County at this time.

2. Demand Comprehensive Impact Studies

Require detailed studies on traffic, road impacts and suitability, environmental to

include stormwater, long term well-water availability, pollution, and noise impacts, as well as an assessment of emergency response capabilities for both the school and event center.

3. Establish Transparent and Community-Centered Processes

Developers must engage in transparent communication and demonstrate how their proposal benefits the local community. Additional public hearings should be convened to ensure that resident voices are fully considered.

In summary, no community member of this road or surrounding roads is opposed to the ideologies, missions or intent of this or any school. We are a diverse group of parents, grandparents, children and families, educators, doctors, laborers, business owners, rural community members, land stewards, farmers, and more. We are simply highlighting the facts surrounding the unacceptable risks to the safety, environment, and quality of life of the surrounding rural community that is often one of the first southern entrances into the beautiful rural landscape that is the county lands surrounding the city of Charlottesville. The proposed development disregards the rural character and fails to align with and rejects the values and priorities enshrined in Albemarle County's Comprehensive Plan and zoning ordinances. The community urges the Planning Commission to uphold these principles by rejecting this proposal.

Thank you for your attention to the Albemarle County rural community concerns.

Dear Mr. Shoaf,

We received a lot of good information about the school proposal at the community meeting on 11/19. Thank you and the County BOS for organizing that and giving the residents some of the details about the school.

I have two primary concerns about the project:

- 1. Traffic. I know that has been voiced. Dudley Mountain Road is narrow two cars can pass each other relatively easily (as long as they hug the shoulder), but *passing a bus or truck takes some faith in the other driver and sucking in of one's breath. The *twisty-ness of either end of Dudley Mountain is another issue, making it harder for oncoming traffic to pass each other on the blind curves. *Fog and fallen trees are not unusual. *The amount of cars either turning left across Route 29 onto Red Hill Road (and left again on DMR), or coming on or off Old Lynchburg Road is going to be a problem. *People are trying to get to work. *There already are trash trucks and school buses trying to navigate the road and other drivers. *DMR is a favorite ride for many bicyclists (that's probably one of your least concerns, but my husband and I ride both DMR and Old Lynchburg, and there do seem to be a lot of other cyclists doing the same).
- 2. Water. 3500 gallons a day is the applicant's estimate. Could the County or an outside vendor do an independent estimate? The residents of DMR are well-dependent. I personally is experiencing well dependence for the first time in my life, and I do worry about water supply. If the residential wells suffer due to the enormous draw of the school, what will happen to the residents?

I love the area - that's why we built out here. And I do love the idea of a Forest School, but I am not sure if this is the right spot. Even if the land was donated.

Thank you for listening. If you have plans that would ease my concerns, I would love to hear them.

My name is Anastasia Camperlengo. I was born and raised in Charlottesville. I grew up off Old Lynchburg Rd in the countryside of Albemarle County. I earned a bachelors and masters degree at UVA and own a home in Charlottesville. I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed construction of a CBI school on Dudley Mountain Rd. This is an agricultural/rural area and not an area for such a large commercial/business venture. It will significantly disrupt the environment on multiple levels to include traffic pollution, noise pollution, water pollution, loss of habitat for our animal friends, and create a busy, chaotic atmosphere disrupting our homes, our lives, and our peace. While I fully support investments in education, this particular location is highly unsuitable for such a development for several pertinent reasons..

First, this narrow country road lacks capacity to handle the significant increase in traffic that a school would generate. Daily commutes involving parents' vehicles, staff cars, and school vehicles would create serious congestion, safety hazards, and a negative impact on the quality of life for local residents. Rural roads are often ill-equipped to accommodate such volumes, particularly during peak hours.

Second, the rural character of this area is incompatible with a large institutional facility like a school. The quiet, serene environment that many residents sought when moving to this location would be disrupted by noise, increased activity, and potential environmental consequences such as the loss of green space and wildlife habitats.

Third, emergency response times could be negatively impacted. Narrow, rural roads may not allow adequate access for emergency vehicles during high-traffic periods, posing a potential risk to students, staff, and local residents alike.

Lastly, I urge the planning commission to consider alternative locations that are better suited to meet the needs of both the community and the CBI school. There are likely more accessible areas with established infrastructure that could provide a safer, more efficient, and less disruptive environment for a school.

I strongly encourage you to consider the wide ranging, negative implications of this current proposal for a CBI school on Dudley Mountain Rd and prioritize the preservation and safety of our rural community. Thank you for your attention on this matter.

DMR is deteriorating every day. The road conditions would not be suitable for the amount of added vehicles this school would bring. VDOT has not done their job in keeping our road safe for the vehicles that are already traveling the road daily. If the school would be approved to be on DMR they would need to repave the entire stretch.

I feel as if the danger of the school being built is not JUST focused towards drivers on DMR. From what I understood from one of the lead voices of the CBI school, the parcel across from the school will be a playground area for the children to use at recess time. That would definitely be a danger to the students and drivers on DMR.

In conclusion, CBI School does not belong on Dudley Mountain Road. I have seen and heard a lot of tragedy by answering 911 calls for 2 years of my life. I live at 1186 Old Lynchburg Road, about a quarter mile north of the Dudley Mountain Road intersection I oppose the CBI Forest School development.

Having a school located there will increased traffic in concentrated time periods on a road that's already not configured for its current traffic load. Large construction vehicles speed and cross the center lane regularly. The road is popular with cyclists who often don't ride single file. There are blind spots where oncoming traffic is unable to see residents pulling out of their driveways - one is at our driveway, another is at Fiddlestick Lane, and there are more of these locations on both Dudley Mountain and Old Lynchburg Road. The sight lines for cars turning left from Dudley Mountain Road onto Old Lynchburg Road and for cars turning right from Dudley Mountain onto Red Hill Road are both limited.

Current traffic regularly speeds on all three of the roads leading to the proposed school site. Arterial roads (I-64 and 29 N) aren't close. Adding dozens of cars to these windy country roads will adversely impact the residents of a large area.

Good afternoon Syd,

I have waited until the last day to submit my thoughts about the school in order to learn as much as possible before writing. I attended the information session last Tuesday evening at Walton Middle School and have read the proposal. I am a 32-year resident of Dudley Mountain Rd, at 1497 (or Rural Route 1, Box 60).

To me, the largest concern is traffic impacts. As a 29-year teacher in schools both public and private, I know the nature of school starts and dismissal. I heard a comment that the CBI school has operated successfully out of Camp Holiday Trails at the end of Reservoir Road, which is also narrow and winding. While this may be so, the Reservoir Road comparison is flawed. To get to and from Camp Holiday trails, there is a 1.7 mile drive on a winding road that merges onto Rte 29 at a dead end. This 1.7 mile stretch is not densely residential, and the outlet puts one immediately onto an arterial road (route 29). In comparison, the drive to the proposed site on Dudley Mtn Rd is 4 miles from the Rte 64 interchange (the nearest arterial road), along a heavily residential roadway. There is a T junction where Old Lynchburg Rd (OLR) meets Dudley Mountain Road (DMR) with residential traffic and cyclists coming from both sides. The line of sight from the DMR-OLR junction is not long (there are blind curves in both directions). Additionally, the heavy cyclist traffic often creates a line of traffic even now, as it is very difficult to pass a cyclist on DMR or OLR.

I hope that these concerns will be considered and that the application will be denied.

Dear Mr. Shoaf,

As a tax-paying land owner of 42 acres on Dudley Mountain Road, I have an invested interest in improving the safety and quality of living in this particular area of Albemarle County.

After studying the Special Use Permit Application authored by Line and Grade Civil Engineers and attending the community meeting on November 19th, it is abundantly clear that the applicant fails in a number of ways to meet the burden of proof that the proposed project is consistent with the comprehensive plan.

Most notably, the proposal IS NOT even remotely "suitable for existing rural roads and result in little discernible differences in traffic patterns." At the community meeting the representative for Line and Grade twice casually mentioned additional traffic was estimated "around 500 vehicles." The study clearly states 573 vehicles - a significant 15% difference (and this does not even take into account the additional students which Line And Grade has publicly stated they plan to increase on an amended proposal). Even if the total number of vehicles on Dudley Mountain Road and Old Lynchburg Road were increased by only 15%, it would be a discernible difference and would change the character of the area. Does the county have a current daily traffic count for the south end of Dudley Mountain Road? My guess is that 573 (+) additional vehicles would more than double the traffic on this narrow, curvy road. Any reasonable person would be hard pressed to consider a 100% traffic increase to fall under the description "little discernible difference in traffic patterns." The applicant's claim is outrageous and would be an increase in danger to all current residents of the area.

On the applicant's original application for Special Use permit dated Sept 4 2024, the applicant claims the special use will be "in harmony with ...the purpose and intent of the Zoning Ordinance." In fact, the reason for the Zoning Ordinance and Comprehensive Plan in the first place is to prevent projects like this school from developing in a rural residential and agricultural area!

It would be a travesty to allow this project to move forward and to irreparably harm the culture and character of this wonderful small road in Albemarle.

I am a homeowner on 2065 Dudley Mtn Rd, and I'm writing to express my serious concerns about the proposed forest school on our street.

1. The Road: When we moved to Dudley Mtn Rd three years ago with our two small kids, I almost didn't purchase the property exclusively because of the road. It's so narrow and dangerous to navigate if there is ANY oncoming traffic. In most cases there is no shoulder to provide buffer to an already narrow road. I was once driven off the road into a ditch where my truck fell onto its side because an oncoming car failed to make room for my truck. Very simply the road cannot handle ANY additional cars. As is, it is a massive hazard that needs to be addressed. There have also been at least a dozen times where I've been stuck because of a downed tree - my husband has had to pull multiple people out of ditches off the side of the road during inclement weather.

Any additional traffic on the road will create a dangerous and untenable driving environment for residents and students alike.

- 2. Shooting: Many residents use their properties on Dudley Mtn Rd for hunting. My next door neighbor regularly shoots deer, coyotes, and turkey that roam our properties. We were advised not to let the kids play in the woods on our own property for fear of a stray bullet coming from hunting neighbors. As a parent, I would be terrified of having my child at a school that neighbors forest land residents use for hunting.
- 3. Precedent: The reason we chose to buy property on Dudley Mtn Rd is because it's a quiet, rural street and it seemed there were local laws in effect to preserve that. In fact, we were told that we couldn't ever

develop our own property and could only have two houses on it (we have 60 acres). Why should this be different for the school? Theres no contribution from the school to the street - all it would do is severely detract from our daily lives and establish a precedent that you can use loopholes in the system to develop where development was never meant to happen.

My hope is that the school realizes that the sheer safety issue this school creates for its students and our residents is enough of a reason to find another location. Absent this, we need you to help prevent an accident that is inevitable should this school be approved.

I'm happy to discuss my concerns further.

I am a homeowner on 2065 Dudley Mtn Rd, and I'm writing to express my serious concerns about the proposed forest school on our street.

1. The Road: When we moved to Dudley Mtn Rd three years ago with our two small kids, I almost didn't purchase the property exclusively because of the road. It's so narrow and dangerous to navigate if there is ANY oncoming traffic. In most cases there is no shoulder to provide buffer to an already narrow road. I was once driven off the road into a ditch where my truck fell onto its side because an oncoming car failed to make room for my truck. Very simply the road cannot handle ANY additional cars. As is, it is a massive hazard that needs to be addressed. There have also been at least a dozen times where I've been stuck because of a downed tree - my husband has had to pull multiple people out of ditches off the side of the road during inclement weather.

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My hope is that the school realizes that the sheer safety issue this school creates for its students and our residents is enough of a reason to find another location. Absent this, we need you to help prevent an accident that is inevitable should this school be approved.

I'm happy to discuss my concerns further.

Dear Mr. Shoaf,

I attended, but did not get a chance to speak at, the recent community meeting you hosted at Walton Middle School. I would like to share some thoughts for your and the staff's consideration as you review the request for a Special Use Permit by Congregation Beth Israel. First, a little background: I have lived in central Virginia for almost 18 years, having arrived in January of 2007. During my time here I have been a professor of Environmental Sciences and of Biology at the University of Virginia. Before then I spent 12 years as a Professor at SUNY Stony Brook, in New York. Since I began my doctoral studies in 1988, one of my major interests has invasive species and Ecology. I have been supported by The Nature Conservancy, the US EPA, and the National Science Foundation to study disturbance and invasions in mid-Atlantic United States. I also worked with Rod Walker of Albemarle County to help found the Blue Ridge PRISM (Program for Regional Invasive Species Management), a USDA-supported program that helps land-owners with invasive species. Before the Pandemic I served for several years on the Albemarle County Natural Heritage Committee, and I now serve on the Charlottesville Tree Commission. I am also a member of CBI, though I have had no involvement with the Forest School in the past or in any of the planning for the site at Dudley Mountain Rd.

A couple of weeks ago, Jill Abbey-Clark of CBI asked if I would look at what she had submitted in her Special Use Permit Application and convey my thoughts to your office. I agreed but told her that I might not be as supportive as she was hoping. I pointed out that I had done some pro bono consulting during the Ragged Mountain biking controversy, and I had sided far more with the NoBike group, even though I was a mountain biker. She said that she wanted my opinion as a professional Environmental Scientist with 30 years of experience since receiving my PhD and that if I had negative comments she wanted them on the record so that she could respond. Below are my quick thoughts after reviewing the submitted proposal and some of the publicly available data and remote sensing imagery for the site.

From an ecological perspective, the property consists of three almost completely different parcels, roughly 10 acres on the south or east side of Dudley Mountain Rd, 15 acres that sit adjacent to it on the north or west, and the back 140 or so. NOTE that I have not formally measured the areas. These are my rough estimates.

The roughly 10 acres on the south/east side of Dudley Mountain Rd. contains the property's most significant riparian area and should be protected. The middle 15 consists largely of highly disturbed ground, including what appears from imagery to be an old Christmas Tree farm. My guess, based on years of research in the Piedmont, is that this area also has a large number invasives because of its heavy history of human disturbance and lack of current management. The north/west 140 acres of the property is the most interesting part ecologically. This part should be protected. It has great value as a forest in and of itself, and as a place for recreation and Natural History education.

I want now to briefly summarize some ecological/environmental features of the plan that speak directly to questions of impact.

- 1. building site locations. All of the proposed buildings will be placed in the already most heavily impacted areas, Area B, so the marginal ecological effects of these buildings will be small. That is, in my professional opinion the buildings proposed will have minimal impacts on both biodiversity and ecosystem processes.
- 2. where development will not occur. Area A offers 140 of permanent protection (through the Conservation Easement) for the highest value, in terms of biodiversity and ecosystem integrity, part of the property. This permanent protection will be a significant contribution to the maintenance of both biodiversity and ecosystem processes in central Virginia.
- 3. where stream protection will occur. A major challenge facing all of Albemarle County, and central Virginia, is maintaining the health of riparian areas. By placing Zone C under permanent easement and committing to the Riparian Buffer Program, this plan does as much as any land use plan can in terms of stream protection. This is another contribution to biodiversity and ecosystem processes in central Virginia, especially to streamwater quality.
- 4. *invasive species control*. I would like to see more detail about how CBI plans to reduce invasive species on the property, though I do not see any of their efforts worsening the situation. If the permit is granted, I will strongly suggest they reach out to Blue Ridge PRISM and develop an integrated invasive species management plan.

 5. *what I would like see in Area A that is not yet there*. One of the major challenges facing efforts to promote biodiversity and ecosystem processes in central Virginia is forest regeneration. This challenge exists largely because deer populations are high and browsing pressures extreme. I would like to see a formal deer management program, at least for the 140 acre part of the property. Given the 5-day a week nature of the school, I think there may be good opportunities for weekend efforts to control deer population through hunting

At the community meeting two issues were discussed that are related to Ecology, and I will to offer my opinions, though I want to stress that my expertise is in neither traffic management nor groundwater hydrology. With respect to the traffic: it seems to that an extra 80-100 cars packed into a brief period in the morning and slightly extended one in the afternoon is not a lot for any public road. But this is why we pay taxes to have a DoT to conduct traffic studies. With respect to the water issues, I was surprised, given my experience with groundwater in other parts of the County (I am the research Director at Morven and have looked at a lot of groundwater maps of the county). I also question the 15gallons/pupil/day number that was cited at the meeting. That seems very high for small children who are going home for most of their washing and eating. I am sure that water use of elementary school students with and without school kitchens (it looks from the school plans that lunch will not be cooked on site) is a well-studied number. I'm sure the County has this number for its schools. Someone should make the effort to find it.

In short, as a professional Ecologist who has worked in mid-Atlantic forests for the last 30 years, I was largely impressed with the permit application narrative. Putting the property into Conservation Easement with roughly 140 out of the 155 acres slated for no building would be a great step forward for the county, and the riparian protection is also significant. I would like to see more about invasive species and deer management plans, but those seem a tractable challenges.

Finally, let me say that I understand that the evaluation process is complex. If there are ways I can be of assistance as you go forward, please do not hesitate to reach. I have done *pro bono* consulting on development questions in the past and would consider helping if asked in this case.

Hi Mr Shoaf,

Thank you for hosting in information session Tuesday evening. I wanted to add a few reasons for my opposition to the CBI Forest School special use application.

I believe the character of the area will be changed drastically to the worse due to:

- 1) Bringing a major change to the traffic patterns in an area barely able to handle the existing flow.
- 2) Making the left out of Fiddlesticks lane on to Old Lynchburg Rd (where folks cannot see oncoming traffic) even more difficult.
- 3) Special event and school traffic will likely result in a large flow leaving the property in a small-time window that will back up at the stop sign leaving Dudley Mountain Rd turning left onto Old Lynchburg Rd. This intersection has limited line of sight to see oncoming traffic, which will cause each car to have an extended period to clear it safely. This will block the driveway in that area causing a detriment to their properties.
- 4) The road is narrow with many curves. Approaching any oncoming traffic, particularly in curves is a harrowing experience. Adding to the frequency of that event adversely affect the character of the road.
- 5) Blue Wheel Bicycles list Dudley Mountain Loop as Low Traffic, Quiet Roads. Seems like this project will severely limit the bike community ability to recreationally cycle in this area of the county.
- 6) We can still see the milky way on Dudley Mountain Road. I can only imagine the project will need significant outdoor lighting to serve the property. This will adversely impact neighboring property's views of the night sky. This will also impact the immediate areas lighting bug population, and neighboring property owners' ability to enjoy their presence.
- 7) Drought conditions are not uncommon for our region. Allowing the project will put an unnecessary burden on area ground water levels and existing residents water supply.

Because of these items, I don't believe this application pass the Factors for Consideration and should be denied.

Thank you for the information and your time at the community information session this week.

I am submitting this communication to express my strong opposition to the proposed location on Dudley Mountain Road for the special use permit SP202400023.

I had the opportunity to review the request and participated in the

community information meeting on 11/19/2024.

I left the informational meeting with greater concerns than I had prior to arriving.

During the informational community meeting when providing an overview of the proposal, several comments were made regarding what the property owner "by right" could do.

This included subdividing of the property, up to 12 divisions and or developing the property for a brewery or winery. It is unclear to

me why these comments were brought into the overview of the proposal, outside of an attempt to **intimidate** the audience.

Then, upon further discussion, there was backpedaling, after questioning, making it unclear that the information was even accurate regarding subdivisions. It is my understanding that even with the owners "by-right" an addition of a brewery or such, would require potential zoning clearance or special permit. I also believe those have a caps on vehicles per day and

These comments were, my opinion, are misleading.

Then, during the meeting, a question regarding the owner's participation on a county board was asked. The property owner, clarified that he does volunteer on an Economic Authority Board. He further explained that he sought legal counsel to determine whether or not there was a conflict of interest and was told that there was none.

In my opinion, the conflict of interest does not sit with the property owner. It sits with the Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission. If any or all of the members on the Board Of Supervisor's and or Planning Commission have a friendly/social/business relationship with the owner of the property, they should recuse themselves from the decision-making process in order to avoid any perception of bias.

Lastly, the final "question" opportunity was given to a supporter of the project who, did not have a questions, but shared a heartfelt story about the importance the

school has for his child. It seems ironic that the last question, wasn't a question and then the session was promptly closed. Was this person planted in the audience?

We also are passionate about where we live and where we are raising our children. We also move here to be closer to nature, watch the hawks, and be outside, hunt, hike, cycle, or walk. We also want to see the stars at night without light pollution. We also want to live in a rural environment with as little traffic as possible.

Did you know there is a flock of wild turkeys that live on the property, that

we enjoy seeing and sharing with our children, which will clearly be displaced by this development.

Why do the desires of the applicant out weigh the desires of those <u>already</u> in the community?

Speaking on behalf of myself and I feel this community, we support the schools initiative and philosophy. Our concerns are solely related to the proposed location on Dudley Mountain Road.

Concerns:

The application which is now being revised to 144 students egregiously underestimates the volume of traffic. It focuses mainly on the incoming and departure of morning and afternoon traffic. There evaluation of traffic also is insufficient when addressing staff, deliveries or their special, multi use building. Will there ever be times parents arrive to pick up children who are sick and then have to come back and pick up a second child? Will parents, grandparents ever come for lunch? Will they ever have school events such as a talent show during the day or after school?

I attended an event at Red Hill Elementary school, where we had four vehicles to see one child. The current state of Dudley Mountain Rd. is in poor condition. It cannot sustain such an increase in traffic. This level of traffic is also likely to cause congestion at the intersection of Old Lynchburg and Dudley Mountain Rd. blocking multiple peoples driveways. Even if the congestion is during specific periods of the day, this fails the criteria to have little discernible difference in traffic, and can cause issues for emergency services for those already in the community.

The road is narrow and often unsuitable for the passing of two vehicles at the same time. This often leads to one vehicle moving off road in order for the vehicles to pass. When incidences have happen often, the police do not issue tickets because the road is so narrow and unmarked. They are unable to determine who's at fault. This is a clear safety issue with a discernible traffic increase and increased potential for emergency services.

As I understand, the application must meet criteria and complement the character of the area and be suitable for existing rural roads and result and little discernible difference in traffic pattern. The substantial increased traffic **will have** a discernible difference in the traffic pattern and this level of traffic is 100% not suitable for the existing rural road. The applicant should not be allowed to minimize this impact and the request should be denied on this alone.

Those who live on Old Lynchburg Road, have to cross the street to collect their mail now will have to contend with well over 500 more cars per day. This also is a safety issue.

The proposed multiuse building:
There was little to information
regarding how many community
events the school might host. Perhaps
they are considering workshops,
fundraising, seasonal festivals,
weddings, retreats, other educational
programs, all of which will have a
substantial traffic flow.

According to the information at the session, there will be parking for 29 spaces and then gravel overflow which does not seem sufficient to accommodate the school let alone a multi-use building for 200 people.

Where will the remaining people be left to park? There clearly is a problem if the multi-use building is used consecutively while the school/daycare is in session. The parking seems wholeheartedly understated in the proposal, which will likely lead to people attempting to park off of Dudley Mountain Rd. This is a safety issue.

Water

As commented during the information session, there is concern regarding the proposed water consumption. The 1200 gallons per day as referenced during the information session is insufficient

and low. And comments regarding these concerns were dismissed. According to drought.gov Albemarle County is in a moderate drought with 95,863 people affected or 96.9% of the community. This is a 100% increase over prior month. The majority of the streams are much below, expected stream flow, and this is after the substantial rains with the hurricane earlier this year. The applicant fails to meet the criteria to have negligible impact on natural resources, and again for this alone, the application should be denied.

The Information provided is incomplete, and at times,

inaccurate. The applicant is minimizing the impact to our community and Fails to meet many of the criteria set for a special use permit: suitable for rural roads, results in little discernible difference in traffic patterns, not in conflict with nearby agricultural and forest uses, have negligible impact on the natural and historic resources generate little demand emergency services.

We live in an area of the county, that is not included as part of the 2015 development plan, this proposal is not consistent with other rural policies and many in this community, including myself, do not

want to see this area further developed, outside of the existing residential/agricultural uses.

There are many reasons this permit should be denied, based solely on criteria. I hope in addition, those making the decision, will value the current resident's opinions, desires and represent us. While the mission of the Forest School is wonderful, the end result is: This is commercial development, in a rural area, wrapped in pretty paper.

Please deny the request.

Hello!

My name is Catherine Lowe, I am currently a resident on Dudley Mountain Dr and I am against the development of an elementary school, CBI Forest School, being built on Dudley Mountain Road. I ask that you do not approve of the special use permit to build the CBI Forest School on Dudley Mountain Road.

As a mother of two young children, I love the concept of the school- we spend most of our free time outside exploring our own land- finding acorns and jumping in puddles. My issues is not the school itself but rather the location of the school.

My first concern is as a family of 4+ living on a well, there are times we have to limit our water use and/or use bottled water due to the limited resources of mountain water. I am against the development of this school due to the schools planned use of the our mountain water. In the meeting they made it seem like it would not tax our water during high use time period but instead would fill their tanks at high, using our mountain water.

My second concern is the safety/traffic of our road. Dudley Mountain Road is a small 1.5 lane road that is just big enough for the residents who live on it. There are times when two bigger size vehicles (including dump trucks coming from the rock quarry) that one car has to pull over to make room for the other vehicle to pass. As residents, we understand this but individuals who do not live in our road do not understand this. As residents we like to walk, run, and bike on our road and to say an increase of 500+ cars a week day will make our small 1.5 lane road extremely unsafe. Traffic- the school plans on making the pick up/drop off lane long so the traffic does not back up onto Dudley Mountain but what about the traffic back up at both stop signs at the end of the road- both are at a blind curve and extremely unsafe for individuals who do not understand the road. With the back up at the stop signs, what about the families who live by the stop signs who will not be able to easily enter and exit their own driveways?

I ask that you do not approve the building of the CBI Forest School on Dudley Mountain Road because of taxation of the limited mountain water that the current residents depend on AND the safety/traffic of the road itself.

Thank you for your time and I ask again that you do not approve the special use permit for the building of the CBI Forest School on Dudley Mountain Road.

On November 19 we attended the community meeting about the proposed school on Dudley Mountain Road. It was a packed meeting and more chairs were required to accommodate everyone. Many, probably most, were residents who have lived on DMR or Old Lynchburg Rd. for decades.

We listened to the presentation by the engineer representing Forest School, we listened to one of the faculty members of the school, we listened to Jeff Morrill who is the property owner. There was not much opportunity for members of the audience to offer opinions but a few questions were asked.

Despite being just over a mile from the nearest development, this property is *not* in the designated growth area. The first phase of this school is only a window into more development. DMR is a rural road, as is OLR, the roads are narrow, winding, with no shoulders or places to pass. People with mailboxes on either road risk life and limb just to get their mail. Despite this the traffic increases yearly with people taking "short cuts" via Route 708 to Routes 29 and 20. Gravel trucks, school busses, and even people riding bicycles add to the problems.

Now we are talking about a totally misrepresented number of cars being added to the mix twice a day for five days plus school events. An event at Forest Lodge this past year backed traffic to a stand still from the event venue over one mile to Southwood. There is no where to pass, or barely even turn around. To avoid this traffic jam one must go all the way back to I64, and 29 South to Route 708 to gain access from the south. One long hill in front of Mosby Mountain is a disaster if there is even a sprinkle of ice or snow, with cars and trucks stuck on the hill. Before Whittington that never happened. Residents told us last night how dangerous the intersection of DMR and OLR can be when trying to make a turn.

Concern about water usage is real. The drought this past summer put a strain on everyone's wells. A facility with 200 plus people a day will only put more pressure on the water situation on DMR. The proposal to put up water tanks doesn't solve the problem, as suggested as they still have to drain a well to fill the tanks. That solution was, frankly, lame.

Arguing that this school will provide more space for students to other schools is also misrepresented. An analogy is widening highways with more lanes to resolve congestion when it has been found to only increase more traffic and more congestion. Putting a school on DMR only invites more special use permits for more development.

We are property owners and have lived off of OLR for 32 years, and we observed that many of the folks at

the meeting were also long time residents of DMR and OLR. We hope that everyone who is to make decisions approving this school understand the repercussions of such an action. Albemarle County has always committed to preserving the rural life of the county. While we are not against this school per se, we feel strongly that the current proposed location is not appropriate primarily for reasons of traffic, water resources that it is zoned rural, and should not pass.

Good afternoon, Rachael,

Thank you for providing public comments for SP202400023 CBI Forest School – Dudley.

A traffic study has not been conducted to assess the feasibility of the plan, however, the applicant has provided a narrative with their application. The narrative includes a section titled, "Impact on public facilities and infrastructure" with a subsection for "Traffic" on page 6. They provide an Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) trip generation numbers that can be reviewed in this section. A traffic impact study is not required by the County unless the ITE estimated vehicles per day is more 1,000. Although this study is not warranted, the applicant is expected to assess impacts and provide alternative solutions.

The County's transportation staff (along with all our partners) are reviewing this application and will provide comments which will be available after the community meeting.

I hope this message finds you well. I am writing to express my concerns regarding the CBI Forrest School development being proposed on Dudley Mountain Rd. While I fully support the addition of educational facilities to our community, I am greatly concerned about the expected increase of traffic on Dudley Mountain Rd.

Dudley Mountain Rd is a narrow, curvy road with no shoulder. As it is now, two large vehicles must pull off the pavement to pass safely. The first mile of Dudley coming from Old Lynchburg Rd is very curved with limited visibility. Good afternoon Syd -

Thank you for working with our community as we struggle with this proposed school on Dudley Mountain Road. You did an excellent job last night and have been an asset for those reaching out prior to the session (myself included).

Below is a summary analysis of SP202400023 and reasons the application should be denied. I have also attached a far more detailed analysis. I hope the County has similar comments to share with the applicant given.

One item I would like to address, it does not appear VDOT did a thorough review of this project which would increase AADT by over 400% on Dudley Mountain Road (understanding a more detailed review is completed during site plan review). I hope planning staff is able to see this gap and address the lack of VDOT's common sense review in the process.

My objections to this project, all of which align with the specific review criteria for new uses in the rural area, are as follows:

- 1. The CBI Forest School would likely increase average daily travel on Dudley Mountain Road from 130 AADT to the estimated 573 trips a 400% increase of traffic for a private use with no guaranteed public benefit to others who reside on this road
- 2. The increase of traffic would create substantial safety risks on this hazardous and deteriorating roadway, endangering drivers, pedestrians, and the many bicyclists who use Dudley Mountain Road. This is most concerning during their peak '15 minute' drop off window in the morning and afternoon. The stacking plan for drop-offs is absent and what preliminary site plans are provided show a clear backup onto Dudley Mountain Road in even the most conservative scenarios.
- 3. This would be the first non-residential/agricultural/forestal use on the roadway and would create unwanted (and unsupported by the County's Comp. plan) development pressure specific to this roadway and areas south. The stated alleviating factors of this, including the conservation easement (which is not in recorded nor in progress) and nature of the school, are irrelevant in the review of this private school use.
- 4. The desired provision for special events can only be tied to the private school use (as this is not a religious assembly SUP a use allowed by right), and thus any event requests related to the private school use should have to follow existing County policies for event permitting. Additionally, there is nowhere near the parking capacity or site infrastructure to support an event of up to 200 attendees.

- 5. Understanding emergency service review is likely to occur during site planning, the rural nature and lack of sufficient safety features in the development plan (namely on-site water sources, sprinklers for fire response) is a threat to the highly sensitive age group the school would serve and adjoining forested parcels.
- 6. Last, the application fails to provide any field analysis proving sufficient groundwater to support daily school use and events up to 200. The cost/intensity of such analysis the applicant stated was an issue during the engagement meeting does not alleviate their responsibility to ensure there is sufficient recharge capacity in the area and they would not impact the 17 other private wells within 2000' of the site.

A more detailed review of the application is attached, please give it a review as I believe it will be informative for your staff's comments. Please let me know if there is anything else I can provide or clarify in these comments.

I am writing to voice my opposition to the proposed school on Dudley Mountain Road.

The current status of this road is that heavy gravel trucks use it as a cut through. The narrow road with no center line often has people driving down the middle of the road.

I've had near misses several times. Once I was literally forced off the road at the curve by an oversized logging truck.

I am concerned about the influx of construction vehicles to build the project as well as the remark that people would be going in an out of the facility four times per day.

Realistically, if there are 144 students plus 28 faculty, this might mean around 600 entrances and exits to the property on weekdays. The morning window around 8:00 a.m. is when people are leaving for work and there's school buses traffic.

Then there's the proposed 6,000 sq. Ft. structure to accommodate 200 people for various meetings. There seems to be NO provision for the parking and this portends high traffic even on the weekends with possibly another 400 or more entrances and exits.

Dear Mr. Shoaf:

Thank you for hosting the meeting tonight. We have several grave concerns about this project's requested location and strongly oppose it. It is not clear that this project would benefit this area in any way. However, the adverse effects are clear, and of a serious magnitude.

- 1. Traffic: Old Lynchburg Road is one of the worst roads in the county and Dudley Mountain Rd you often have to pull over and stop when there is another car approaching because it is basically a one lane road. There are people on bicycles riding these roads frequently. There are log trucks, dump trucks, landscaping trailers and many local residents who work hard for a living who drive oversized vehicles for work. There are also other issues like the mail delivery vehicle that stops the traffic. As well, we often have to drive our tractors and backhoe on Old Lynchburg Rd to get from one tract of our land to the other. Please don't forget that this is still an agricultural area and people still farm and want to farm. One tractor will hold up traffic for quite a delay, or worse, people in a hurry will try to drive around the tractor, or the mail truck, or the people on bicycles. It is a very dangerous road at baseline. Those people coming from south of town would need to cross a one lane bridge on Old Lynchburg Rd which is not well marked and another dangerous spot where accidents occur. Probably most people are thinking of traffic coming from Charlottesville, however, you must consider the increase in traffic coming off of Red Hill Rd to Dudley as well as from the southern part of Old Lynchburg Rd. Of course, there are numerous dump trucks loaded with gravel from the quarry that travel that route. Construction vehicles for the project and then ongoing vendor large trucks are also a concern. Bottom line: the access roads from the north and the south are currently inadequate for any additional traffic. Widening the roads means taking land away from private owners, many, many private owners to achieve that goal. Safety first and these roads are UNSAFE to handle the proposed extra load.
- 2. This project is non-residential and non-agricultural. It does not belong here. It sets a terrible and ominous precedent for future development. Although the name of the school is "Forest School", there is nothing forest friendly about a 6,500 square foot and an 11,000 square foot building, not to mention the parking lots that accompany a project like this, or the pollution this brings. That is alot of construction, plus digging sewer lines and footings- this all disturbs the flow of the water. Water is a precious resource and many residents on Dudley Mountain Rd already experienced water shortages this past summer with their wells going dry. CBI quoted "17 gallons a minute" which is not much for a well or for the amount of daily water usage they proposed. How are we to water our crops? No water, no farmland. Or is it in the plan to run public water there? That would entail alot of land disturbance and would be it's own land disturbance disaster. What's next? A Starbucks and a gas station across from the school?

- 3. Negative effect on wildlife and the environment. We already have a problem with bears coming to the house due to habitats being diminished by development. More people, more trash, more bear issues. Not to mention, people still actively hunt out this way...I wouldn't want my kids playing in the woods around here, especially not during hunting season.
- 4. Crime: why do they want to come to southern Albemarle where there are lots of meth addicts and criminals? It's a rough area, just ask the police. It doesn't bode well for them. The concept of the school is a good one, they should go somewhere they are wanted.
- 5. How will this affect our tax assessments and property values? There are so many lower income families that have lived here for several generations that are being crushed by increasing real estate taxes as this area slowly gets gentrified. How is it OK for upper class/wealthy people who can afford to send their kids to private school to burden the lives of the area residents, many of whom are lower class hard working people. This area is farmland and salt of the Earth people. Please do not crap on them.
- 6. It was misleading at the meeting for CBI to state 'they will put the land in a conservation easement' when they haven't even started that lengthy process or found a non-profit entity willing to consider that parcel. It is not even clear if that parcel would be eligible for a conservation easement. If in fact, it was already placed in a conservation easement, with clearly delineated and deeded restrictions, this proposal would be slightly more palatable to consider. As it stands now, the proposal is for a day care and up to 5th grade, however, the "multipurpose 11,000 square foot building" sounds alot like a future middle and high school which would bring additional traffic and water issues. Future development and future requests for additional students and buildings are a concern.

I believe that the presentation was also misleading to state that the school is "fully outdoors" when they are proposing a 6,000 square foot and an 11,000 square foot building (in addition to the five 1200 square foot cabins). It was also misleading to say that the designated parcel 'could have been a 12 parcel subdivision' instead. A community member challenged this and then the statement was modified to state 'that was true for the 200+ acre parcel and this parcel together.' The number of misleading representations this evening did not lay ground for a trusting interaction.

Perhaps an idea would be for Albemarle County to lease/sell part of the 1100 acre Biscuit Run Park (which the county does not have enough money to fully develop) and they could develop and utilize the park. At the meeting there was a question if the community could somehow benefit from the school infrastructure. With the right modifications of the plan, there could be a clearly designated "public access" area and the private school area that benefits all.

Another solution is for them to stay where they are. We do not want them in our neighborhood.

Hello, I hope this finds you well with the beautiful weather and fall foliage.

I wanted to reach out and voice concerns from me and my family regarding the proposed school on Dudley Mountain Road.

As a homeowner and current president of the Poplar Ridge Owners Association, just about 1/4 mile from the proposed site, this came about rather quickly, as the first notice we received was (I'm assuming due public records about our kids), an advertisement for the school at an undisclosed location, that upon inquiring is just up the road from us.

Then, within days, notices begin to get forwarded to me both as a homeowner on DMRd and from my concerned Association members on Poplar Ridge (Poplar Drive, as per mailing address).

Many of the residents on DMRd have lived there for years, with quite a few property passed on for several generations due to the wonderful proximity to Charlottesville and UVA, but for the quaint and rural surroundings and traffic flow.

The road, as I'm sure you know, is multimodal, apart from local traffic and an occasional cut-through vehicle, many a scenic drive vehicle. On any given day, you will also see pedestrians, walking, running, or pushing a stroller ... bicycles, and even occasionally some horses.

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Hello Mr Shoaf,

My name is Kateri Thunder and I live at 2120 Masseys Woods Rd.

I'm writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed school at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road.

The proposed school would create a dangerous and potentially deadly amount of traffic on the road.

- Dudley Mountain Road is a rural road without lines. It is winding and has many blind curves. At one end, the speed limit drops to 20mph and the road further narrows. Overall, Dudley Mountain Rd is barely wide enough for two vehicles (if they are sedans) and not wide enough for a car passing a truck, bus or delivery van we often have to pull over to allow the larger vehicle past. With minimal traffic, this can be typically navigated with safety but with triple or quadruple the amount of traffic (as is proposed by the school), this will quickly become dangerous.
- Dudley Mountain Road has many potholes and the road is wearing away. We recently had a pipe collapse under the road and it needed to be replaced. Increased traffic would accelerate these issues.
- During any windy, rainy, or snowy weather, there are frequently trees down, and in snow, the road is quickly impassible. School traffic would greatly increase the number of vehicles attempting to drive in poor weather to pick up their children. Additional traffic often leads to a domino effect of cars stalled and run off the road, which can go from dangerous driving to deadly scenarios.
- Many neighbors walk, run, and bike on Dudley Mountain Road. This is hazardous. We recently had a cyclist hit and run on our road. With increased traffic, the dangers for everyone on the road will also increase and become potentially deadly.

The proposed school would disproportionately use neighborhood natural resources in ways that are unsustainable and an environmental hazard.

- On Dudley Mountain Road, we rely on well water which means we are all drawing from the same natural water source. The proposed school would disproportionately draw from our common water source. For school sprinklers, educators and students to use water as they propose in the school, the surrounding homes would suffer. This plan is unsustainable.
- On Dudley Mountain Road, we do not have sewage systems. The proposed school plans to deposit their sewage into a drain field which would create exponentially more sewage than neighboring homes. This creates an environmental hazard.

The proposed school would put children and teachers in danger during hunting season.

• Living on Dudley Mountain Road means living in a rural community of hunters. Most of our neighbors are active hunters on their own properties. While they make every effort to stay on their own property, bullets do not know property lines, and nor do hunting dogs. We regularly have hunters mistakenly crossing our property line and we find hunting dogs in our yard and woods. In order to be safe during hunting season, we do not hike in our woods or allow our children to play in the woods. No one on Dudley Mountain Road would want to hurt a neighbor, a child, a student, a teacher, or any person. The reality of a rural neighborhood is that hunters will be on their properties hunting and bullets don't stop simply because the hunter missed their mark or the property boundary was reached. I am extremely concerned for the students, teachers, and families of the proposed school that they will unwittingly be enjoying the forest during hunting season and be in accidental deadly danger.

I request the zoning commission deny the proposal to rezone the property for the school.

I wish the Forest School and CBI the very best in finding another property that is already zoned for school or business use so that their students can flourish while also allowing our neighborhood to remain safe and sustainable for its residents.

Subject: comments on the Special Use Permit application by the CBI Forest School

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Dear Mr. Syd Shoaf,

I am writing this e-mail in response to the Special Use Permit application by the CBI Forest School to allow development for a private school and multipurpose building for CBI community gatherings on Parcell 89-64 (1647 Dudley Mountain Road). We reside in a house located on a parcel 89-63A, which is directly adjacent to the proposed location of the CBI development. I carefully reviewed the report prepared by the Line and Grade Civil Engineering company, and I find that it reads as a promotional booklet and not as an impartial assessment of the impact of the proposed project on the surrounding properties and on the neighborhood as a whole. Below I briefly outline some of my major concerns related to this project.

Traffic: It is difficult to see how the Line and Grade Civil Engineering company arrived to the conclusion that the proposed development "has low demand on existing rural roads." Dudley Mountain Road is a narrow (about 16-feet-wide) winding road with no shoulders and no center line. It is so narrow that two regular-size cars have to slow down and sometimes pull off the pavement to pass safely. Moreover, part of the road between Old Lynchburg Road and the proposed site of the school has several particularly dangerous turns with limited visibility. The proposal suggests that more than a hundred cars can bring children to the school and leave the site within just 15 minutes. From my experience of driving on this road for the last 20 years, it is difficult to see how this can be done in a safe manner.

Moreover, inclement weather makes the road particularly dangerous. From my personal experience, one winter I was once slowly (less than 10 mph) driving on a slippery road and faced another car that lost control and was (slowly) moving toward me. To avoid collision, I had to turn to the ditch and stop by hitting a tree. I would not be surprised to see a significant increase in accidents if many people, particularly those unfamiliar with the road, would start using it during rush hours.

The report notes that Dudley Mountain Road "is a very low volume road currently." This is a correct observation. Increasing the volume would make the road dangerous. Moreover, the road is one of just a few rural roads in the vicinity of Charlottesville that are relatively safe for bicycle riders. Over the weekends, in particular, many cyclist are using the road, some people are walking their dogs and walking for exercise. Adding 200 people coming and going to the CBI-organized weekend events would be a recipe for disaster.

Groundwater use and quality: The yield of the 160-feet-deep well that supplies water to our house is rather low (nominally 7 GMP, but we experience inadequate water supply after long dry periods). The report states that the proposed new wells will be located within the same hydrogeological unit as our well, but makes a general assessment that adding new wells serving 200 people in the close vicinity of our well would not result in "long-term degradation of groundwater resources." This assessment is done using some average quantities (e.g., the average yield of wells in the vicinity of the proposed site of 17 GPM), and we have concerns about the actual impact of the extensive water use (significantly above the levels used by normal residence houses) on the yield of our well, as well as the wells of other neighbors.

Water contamination is another concern we have. I am not a hydrologist, but the statement in the report that the anticipated groundwater use at the proposed site would "actually benefits the local groundwater supply" sounds very surprising to me. It is explained in the report that these benefits will result from the fact that "the majority of the water used on site will be put back into the ground and filtered through the soil." I do not understand why adding large quantities of human waste and filtering it through the soil benefits the groundwater?

The rural character of the area: While the report states that the rural character of the area will be preserved, the activities of the school (28 staff members and up to 140 students on weekdays and up to 200 attendees of the CBI events on weekends) will definitely have a major impact on the current community. Dudley Mountain Road is a quiet rural community, where all residents value the rural character of the neighborhood, respect each other, and appreciate the tranquility of the place. When one of the neighbors had a wedding for his daughter, he informed all neighbors about the event with live music two weeks in advance and apologized for the inconvenience. Nobody plays music outside or hosts crowded events. The proposed school will drastically change the environment and is likely to trigger further changes in the neighborhood.

When making the case of the minimal impact on the rural nature of the proposed development, the report emphasizes the large overall size of the parcel compared to the size of the proposed developed area. While conservation easement is proposed for area A (140 acres) and area C (10 acres), these are the areas where the development would either be very difficult or impossible due to critical slopes and potential floods around the streams. The proposed development area of 15 acres is the area directly adjacent to Dudley Mountain Road and is the part of the parcel where the development is possible. The development of this part of the parcel will have the largest impact on the adjacent properties.

While the participation of the CBI in James River Buffer Program is listed as an argument illustrating the positive impact of the proposed School, I would like to note that we also applied for participation in this program. Moreover, most of the neighbors are taking good care of their land, including the efforts on removal of invasive species and maintaining the forested areas. We "adopted" the road, and collect garbage together several times a year.

Personal note: The rural nature of the place was by far the most important reason we decided to build our first home in America on Dudley Mountain Road more than 20 years ago. We are a family of first-generation immigrants, and we thought we will permanently stay in this place, gradually improve the land, and pass it to our children. It came as a very unpleasant surprise to us when we learned that the adjacent property was bought with the intention of building a school and a multipurpose building for large weekend gatherings. If this project is approved and moves forward, more likely than not, we will have to look for another place to move to. We realize that private schools and places for social/community activities are important and needed. We hope, however, that the county will take into consideration the major negative impact of inserting a new private school and a community building into an existing well-established rural residential neighborhood that does not have adequate infrastructure to absorb it. Such unexpected insertion will cause major problems for current long-term residents and is likely to result in major irreversible shifts in the nature of local community.

Thank you for considering my concerns.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the application for a Special Use Permit for the proposed CBI Forest School and Daycare complex at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road. While I respect the mission of the school, I believe this development would have significant and irreversible impacts on our community and environment.

1. Incompatible Land Use

The proposed project would introduce the first non-residential/agricultural development along this scenic roadway, altering the character of the area. Allowing this precedent-setting use could encourage further development, eroding the rural and residential nature of the community we value.

Mr. Shoaf,

I am writing to express our strong opposition to the proposed Special Use Permit for the CBI School on Dudley Mountain Road. As a landowner for over 25 years and a current resident of the adjacent property, we am deeply concerned about the potential negative impacts this project could have on our land. These concerns include the **infringement on private rights**, a significant decrease in property value, and the loss of hunting and other recreational activities.

This area is characterized by low population density due to the larger parcels of land and offers abundant natural resources and stunning views for the community to enjoy. Permitting this development would encroach upon an otherwise rural area and disrupt the tranquil, rural environment that currently exists.

Additionally, we have some concerns regarding the following:

Traffic Congestion: The proposed development will significantly increase traffic on Dudley Mountain Road. This road is narrow, curvy, and in poor condition, which creates safety hazards for both residents and bicyclists. I am also concerned about the safety of children and their families who travel to and from the school daily. Furthermore, the application provides a poor estimate of the number of vehicular trips per day. I am uncertain how the calculation of 140 students and 28 staff results in only 109 trips. Even if this is the current estimate, those trips are likely to change from year to year and could increase if the school expands. A more accurate estimate would be closer to 400 trips, not including larger vehicles for trash collection, cleaning, supplies, and other deliveries.

In addition, traffic on roads leading to Dudley Mountain Road also are strained and in poor condition. A good example would be an event held last year at Forest Lodge on Old Lynchburg Road which created a 1 mile back up and traffic was at a standstill for over 45 minutes.

Environmental Concerns: The proposal indicates that EMS plans to use the creek as a water supply. As a long-time resident, I firmly believe that this creek does not provide a sufficient water source for emergency services. We are aware of the limited water supply in our area, often experiencing days without water. The Line & Grade report further supports this, noting that the water output for four parcels around the proposed development is poor. Approving this large development would place additional strain on the water supply. If the water supply were to dry up for neighbors, who would be held responsible — the County or CBI?

Furthermore, as a rural residential community, this development would introduce light and noise pollution from the school. In addition to regular school activities, the facility would be approved to host events for up to 200 people at any time, further increasing the light and noise neighbors would have to experience.

Community Disruption: The construction process is expected to create significant noise and disruption in our daily lives for an extended period, which would negatively affect the quality of life for residents in the area. Additionally, we are concerned about runoff from the construction impacting our property.

I strongly urge the Planning Commission to carefully review the potential negative impacts of this project and find a more appropriate home for the CBI school. I believe that approving this proposal would not be in the best interest of the Dudley Mountain Road community.

Greetings Mr. Shoaf,

As one of the residents of DMR, I'd like to highlight a few critical items that may assist the County in making the best decision to reject CBI's request.

- 1. The most obvious concern: The untenable traffic increase that such a school would create, (which has been largely played down by CBI's engineering consultant), would be more than sufficient to warrant rejection of this special use request. There are many indisputable factors involved. The significant added daily traffic on this already inadequate road would radically decrease safety to people and property. No one that I know of would want to see daily [police traffic control (which is highly likely) implemented at either the school site or at the intersection of DMR and Old Lynchburg Rd., (reminiscent of that which is now in effect, related to the Covenant School, on Old Lynchburg Rd./5th St. not far from the County office building)! DMR is a relatively narrow, twisting, low quality country road. It quickly becomes obvious what the effect is when two 8-foot wide school buses, traveling in opposite directions on a 16-foot wide road, pass each other; the vehicles slow to a crawl and one holds one's breath. (It's almost comical to note at this juncture that in the last 20 years or so, the 3-board fence along my 1800-foot frontage on DMR has been hit by vehicles 11 times, damaging from 16' to 150' sections each time)!
- 2. I know of a few residences adjacent to, as well as nearby, the proposed project site that, in drier years, have experienced water well deficiencies [low water levels with sand and mud] in their wells that appear to draw from the same subsurface aquifer structure as the project would. This does not bode well to say the least taking into account the considerable water usage expected at a school.
- 3. I don't even want to think about what the potential worse case outcome could be for sewage effluent from a couple hundred people students, faculty, support personnel, etc. [daily] regarding the adjacent small streams, at times running at a trickle or dry.

- 4. Using this area to establish a school is a far cry from the originally-intended single family/agricultural use wisely established many years ago to help curtail development. If this is approved, it leaves this serene area of natural beauty susceptible to further unnecessary development, some of which could conceivably be enhancements to the school project itself. This goes against the quality of life that so many of the residents of this area sought when moving here.
- 5. Considering the proposed use of "gravel" driveways, gutters, parking areas, etc. it would be very tricky indeed to prevent soil, sand, silt from this development eroding and washing into local streams during heavy rains.
- 6. Did I see where fire trucks would have to rely on local streams for water in a fire emergency? These streams do not carry the amounts of water required for that use!
- 7. While this particular site would be nice for any school or daycare, this location is certainly not essential for the success of such a facility. There are many other suitable sites, with more appropriate support infrastructure, that would better accommodate this project without negatively impacting so many people.
- 8. This project would be exponentially larger than any construction undertaking on DMR. In no way can its size and scale be construed as being complementary or even compatible with the area, (which I believe is another County requirement).
- 9. Even if there would be a desire to dismantle such a facility, in the future, it would be difficult, costly, and basically unfeasible to do so considering the proposed 20,000+ SF of buildings planned. I believe County requirements would come into play here.
- 10. Common sense alone would indicate that the potential need for County services fire, first aid, police would increase with the sheer number of people, facilities, and traffic involved. (I believe this also is contrary to County requirements).

Despite all the obvious negatives this proposed project would cause the County and the hundreds of local residents, I know that there may be strong commercial and political entities and organizations applying pressures on the County to approve this special use request. We hope the County will not submit or concede to an unnecessary commercial endeavor that would so affect several hundred people on a daily basis in this near-pristine low-density residential/agricultural environment.

Is it not easy enough to see the over-development in progress in Charlottesville and portions of the County adjacent? Hasn't anyone in County management noticed trends of traffic increases and delays and need for additional services? Rejection of this permit would be the right step in helping curtail the unbridled and wholly unnecessary commercial development of this beautiful County.

Approval would be so wrong on so many fronts.

My name is Adam Southall and I live at 2120 Masseys Woods Road off of Dudley Mountain Road. I am writing to express my concerns for the proposed school at 1648 Dudley Mountain Road.

The proposal put forth would increase traffic to a dangerous and unsustainable level. Dudley Mountain Road is a narrow, curvy, rural road. It is dangerous already given the narrowness of the lanes, the lack of lines, and the size of vehicles that travel it regularly. The increase of drivers required for the forest school will turn a dangerous situation into a deadly situation quickly.

Additionally, our road is already in need of repair. There are potholes forming and parts of the edges are crumbling, further narrowing the roadway. Just last week a bridge over a waterway just south of Poplar Lane had to be replaced as it was crumbling into the water and a severe dip was forming where the asphalt was sinking.

My other concern for this school is in relation to the runoff and water usage of the facility. There is no public water in our neighborhood. We all pull from the same water sources. A building of that size will require an unsustainable amount of water to provide sprinklers and water for people. Pulling from the already limited water supply is a natural resource problem. Homes around the school will suffer.

The sewage runoff from the building will be another problem. There is no sewage system to maintain that amount of human waste. Depositing it into a drain field is an inappropriate action that is currently being proposed by the school. This is an environmental hazard.

I request the zoning commission deny the proposal to rezone the area for the school. Our school should not house a school facility as we are not equipped for that type of resource use and traffic.

My name is Mike Ginsburg and I live at 4160 Lofton Lane off Dudley Mountain Road (DMR) in North Garden. I have been a resident of Albemarle County for the last 24 years.

I am writing to express my opposition to Congregation Beth Israel's Forest School application on DMR.

DMR is a narrow, rural road with dangerous s-turns near the intersections of Old Lynchburg Road and Red Hill Road. I would encourage you to drive the entire 4-mile road to appreciate residents' concerns. In addition, throughout the entire length of DMR, you do have to drop down to very low speeds when you are passing school buses or work trucks, often moving your wheels off the road so that both vehicles can pass. The addition of Forest School to DMR without widening and correcting the road would create a dangerous situation at various school traffic surge times. It would also create a problematic situation at the intersection of DMR and Old Lynchburg since there is a blind corner with vehicles traveling southbound on Old Lynchburg typically traveling 45mph or above. DMR is a dangerous, narrow and rural road not equipped at all to handle this drastic increase in vehicle volume.

DMR is a fairly obscure road that many people are unaware of. Bicyclists love DMR for this reason as it provides a sanctuary from riding on Old Lynchburg and the dangers that it poses. It's a bit of a secret road in the county with large 100+ acre farms mixed in with homes on 1-5 acres. There are no commercial enterprises beyond working farms on DMR. It's very rural with lots of wildlife, and a large private school would be out of character with the community on DMR. We have watched large subdivisions creep down Old Lynchburg over the years. Using 15 acres of land for 25,000 square feet of buildings with 400+ daily vehicle trips and likely more in the future totally changes the community on DMR.

I would ask that you strongly consider the voices and concerns of the DMR community members that actually live on the road and not approve the CBI's Forest School application. Thank you.

Good afternoon, Rachael,

Thank you for providing public comments for SP202400023 CBI Forest School – Dudley.

A traffic study has not been conducted to assess the feasibility of the plan, however, the applicant has provided a narrative with their application. The narrative includes a section titled, "Impact on public facilities and infrastructure" with a subsection for "Traffic" on page 6. They provide an Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) trip generation numbers that can be reviewed in this section. A traffic impact study is not required by the County unless the ITE estimated vehicles per day is more 1,000. Although this study is not warranted, the applicant is expected to assess impacts and provide alternative solutions.

The County's transportation staff (along with all our partners) are reviewing this application and will provide comments which will be available after the community meeting.

Rachael Ayers 2018 Dudley Mountain Rd. 8074-426-8411 I reside at 1680 Dudley Mountain Road and wish to address the Special Use Permit request for the CBI Forest School on Parcel #89-64, 1648 Dudley Mountain Road.

I have reviewed the engineering report prepared by Line & Grade and find the conclusions to be inaccurate and strongly biased in favor of the project. Major deficiencies exist regarding the road access, water use impact, and septic discharge and impact.

The project must "be suitable for existing rural roads and result in little discernable difference in traffic patterns". Anyone turning from Old Lynchburg Road onto Dudley Mountain Road will quickly realize that this rural road is unsuitable for this project. The 140 students and 28 staff can be expected to result in an additional 573 vehicle trips per day, not including up to 200 attendees for weekend use and special occasions. These facts are downplayed by Line & Grade who speculate about extensive car pooling rather than allowing for the probable worst case scenario. My son is a civil engineer who has worked for the Vermont Department of Transportation and knows Dudley Mountain Road well and feels that this road is inadequate for this project.

The water output from a well can only be known after a well is drilled. The 4 closest wells on either side of the project have very poor output in data provide by Line & Grade which does not support their conclusion about adequate supply for 168 people without effect on nearby long standing residents. [89-63A 7 GPM @ 160 ft, 89-63B1 1 GPM @ 405 ft, 89-73F 4 GPM @ 405 ft, 89-73F1 3 GPM @ 505 ft].

Line & Grade provide no details regarding the septic system and its impact other than to say that the drainfield benefits local groundwater and will be filtered through the soil. Perhaps Albemarle County should import large quantities of human waste and distribute throughout the county to benefit the groundwater. Construction has begun prior to obtaining the Special Use Permit suggesting confidence in its approval. The property owner, Jeffrey Morrill, as vice chair of the Albemarle Economic Development Authority undoubtedly has influence within county government. Any county employee involved in this process with prior or potential future involvement with Mr Morrill should recuse themselves. If needed for impartiality, a suitable individual from outside Albemarle county should be utilized.

To whom it may concern,

This letter is being submitted for the record. We are Mark and Teresa Andrews, and we have been residents on Dudley Mountain Rd. for forty years. As one of the original families on Dudley Mountain Rd., the rural scenic beauty was something that attracted us to purchase and develop our home/property. It was a safe and wonderful place to raise our family. Our two boys and their friends, who would come from other areas in the county and city to visit us, enjoyed all that the outdoors had to offer. Over the years, controlled residential development has occurred while the quiet, agricultural, and rural benefits of country living has been maintained.

Dudley Mountain Rd., a small, narrow road will not handle increased traffic. Presently the traffic has to slow or stop to allow oncoming larger vehicles like school buses, garbage and dump trucks to pass. In the winter, Dudley Mountain Rd. is treacherous. Additionally, Old Lynchburg Rd. and Dudley Mountain Rd. are a popular cycling route that presently increase the danger of traveling. Riders have had incidents causing serious injuries and even death. Dudley Mountain Rd. is currently in need of road improvements and is not adequate to safely handle any projected increase in traffic.

The projected increases in the number of vehicles traveling to/from the proposed Congregation Beth Israel - 200 attendees + staff and service vehicles, special events will compromise the safety, beauty, and serenity of our rural living.

We are aware of reported safety concerns about the number of vehicles (100+ a minimum two times a day) and the danger it presented when the Congregation Beth Israel traveled on the narrow access road to Camp Holiday Trails. We are also aware that Congregation Beth Israel proposed to develop this project on land off of Owensville Rd. and it was nixed.

We also have very legitimate concerns about the environmental impact on rural well water, our electrical grid, increased noise, and a detrimental impact on the beautiful wildlife and other natural resources that benefit us all.

It is also worth noting, the impact of increased traffic on Old Lynchburg Rd. is yet to be determined. This is because the new subdivision development at the old Southwood area is not fully opened and operational. Hundreds of new homes and mixed housing has not been completed. Traffic from Dudley Mountain Rd. to 5th Street Ext at 164

will soon be at a standstill. In the mornings, it already requires support from the County Police Dept. to direct increases in traffic as people navigate to get to Covenant School.

As residents on Dudley Mountain Road, we have not received any official notification (written or email) from the Albemarle County Board of Supervisors and Albemarle County Planning Commission members regarding the proposed project. The only notice we have received is a written postcard from the Dudley Mountain Road Neighbors which we received on Saturday, November 16. It is both inadequate and unjust to receive this minimal communication two days before the proposed community meeting scheduled for Tuesday, November 19.

The deception and lack of transparency about the proposed project is not a way to begin a proposed development. A new access road to what appears to be the proposed project has recently been cut on November 7, and was completed on November 15, heightening our concerns that decisions have already been made. In no way does this follow Albemarle County protocol. This is unacceptable in every way. We oppose new development that would override and go against current zoning ordinances. We are very concerned about how increases in motor vehicle traffic and proposed activities at the private school would be detrimental to our safety and also disrupt our quality of life in this community.

Concerns and Objections to Proposed Forest School/Event Center

Dear Syd,

Thank you for your efforts to ensure our community's voice is heard. I am certain you are receiving a high volume of feedback.

On behalf of my family residing on Dudley Mountain Road (DMR), I would like to express our strong opposition to the proposed Forest School and Event Center. Roads like DMR, characterized by their natural beauty and tranquility, are increasingly rare. The preservation of this environment is the primary reason we chose to live here. Please consider the following concerns and questions:

The proposal lacks sufficient detail and clarity. This proposal should be denied.

• The Multi-Use Building

- o I'm not sure whether the term "Wolf in Sheep's Clothing," or "Trojan Horse," works best to describe this project. If CBI wanted to build a wedding venue, barmitzvah and batmitzvah venue, and event space why is that not the lead here?
- We simply cannot have an 11,000sqft building with no rules other than, "no more than 200 people." What hours would these events be? What would be the impact on noise and light ordinances? Where in the world will 200 cars park (and yes, of course, most families are multi-car families...so 200 is not a realistic number for parking).
- The proposal is very misleading. Let us not be mistaken. This is not a "minimally invasive forest school."
- This proposal should be denied for this alone.

Traffic

- This proposal does not fit the requirement that it would result in "little discernible difference in traffic patterns."
- O The number of trips listed in the proposal is very underestimated. To have even their grossly underestimated number of cars come and go four times on this little road would completely overwhelm the families who live here and destroy the rural nature of the road itself. This would set up a scenario where residents would need to time their schedules so as not to run into the third of a mile long cavalcade during drop off and pick up times. (The average length of a vehicle in the US is 14.7 feet. 110 Cars x 14.7 feet = 1617 feet or roughly 1/3 of a mile!!!)
- The amount of time given for drop off and pick up is way too short. Children under the age of 7 simply cannot hop out of the car and run into the school. Many will need to be carried. This will require parking.
- At what time will the teachers and administrators arrive? At what time will they depart? This disruption is not included in the proposal at all.
- How will the children be fed? Will there be a daily staff of cafeteria workers? Will there be massive delivery trucks from US Food or Aramark making regular deliveries?
- When will the cleaning crews access the site? Daily? How many will be needed to take care of these massive structures?
- How will supplies be delivered and how often? Toilet paper, pens, pencils, crafting supplies, copy paper, are all necessary for a school.
- When will the landscaping, lawn mowing, and outdoor crews be allowed on property?

 Do we anticipate having a police officer at the intersection of DMR and Old Lynchburg Rd to direct traffic? Do we anticipate a stop light?

Disruption of Neighbors, Nature, and everyone who travels this road

- Traffic this disturbance is undeniable
- Light Pollution Will the site have lighting? Currently, this corner of DMR at nighttime is so
 wonderfully dark. With this square footage, I assume outdoor lighting would be necessary for
 security purposes if nothing else. Will there be lighted paths? All of this will disturb the
 neighborhood and nature as well.
- Sound Pollution Recently I was spending time with a friend and her two children were capable
 of making an incredible amount of noise. What can we be expected to hear with 140 kids on
 site? Of course, there will be other noises too -- bells ringing, announcements, fire drills, parties,
 dances, etc. This is not the place for all that noise.
- Trash Pollution An increase of this many people, regardless of their age, will increase the
 amount of trash along the roadside, on the property, and throughout the adjacent nature and
 personal properties of others.
- Pollution Pollution
 - Automobile pollution.
 - Heating and Cooling pollution. How will the school buildings be heated and cooled? Gas/Oil boiler? Giant HVAC units?
 - Gas Generator Pollution. Will there be a gas generator on site, since we are without power on average 3-4 times per year?
 - Campfires. Smoke
 - Sewage
- Pets This increased activity will endanger our dogs and cats in a much larger way than we've ever seen before. Currently a majority of the residents of DMR have pets. Most of these pets roam freely and they will not get the memo when this barrage of cars descends on their quiet country road. Who will be responsible for the death of our pets?
- Rights
 - Hunting All of the neighbors of the proposed site currently hunt their land and adjacent land for much of the year. Many of them use this as food for their families. This would seem to represent an extreme danger, unless we are suggesting taking away those family's rights to hunt on their own property? Do we intend on taking away those family's rights?
 - Shooting When they are not hunting, many neighbors regularly shoot their guns as a pastime/hobby. Do we intend on taking these rights away?

Danger

- Rush Imagine you are running late to drop off your kids at school because little Rebecca decided to rub peanut butter into her brother's hair right before you were supposed to leave. If you don't hurry, you'll miss the drop off window and also be late for work. You might take it a bit slower while the kids are in the car for their sake, but once you drop them off, you're going to put your foot in the carburetor and rip down this curvy road that is not meant for that kind of driving. This is going to be a headache at the very least, and fatal at the very worst. Who will be responsible for these accidents?
- Fire / Rescue Squads
 - What would happen if a fire were to start at the school? We have an already taxed volunteer fire department. Would the school fund its own fire safety brigade?

- What would happen if there is a fire/rescue emergency on the road during the drop off and pick up periods? How would emergency vehicles be able to get past the line of cars? There is no shoulder on Dudley Mountain Rd.
- Hospital Have we properly thought through what happens when the nearest hospital is far away and 10 of the kids happen into a yellowjacket's nest...some of whom will most certainly be allergic? What about a copperhead's nest?
- Shoulders There are no shoulders on DMR. There are so many stories of oil trucks, quarry dump trucks, tractors, and other large vehicles that have to ride in the middle of the road because they do not want to turn over. Ask anyone who has lived here and they will no doubt have a story about a vehicle that has run them into the ditch, or a vehicle that has flipped over because they were too top heavy and went too far over the edge of the road.
- Hunting/Shooting Please see above. All it takes is for one kid to make a stupid mistake and wander into an area he's not supposed to be in.

Not necessary for this site

- Though the forest school is designed to let kids experience nature while learning, there is nothing particularly special about this site that could not be found in other rural areas, or even a non-rural area that abuts a park or natural preserve.
- There are plenty of areas within the county's "development areas" that do not require a special
 use permit that could be a great home for a school and wedding/event venue of this nature.
 These locations feature better roads, better access to fire and emergency services, and are closer
 to CBI itself.

Requirements

• This project does not "relate directly to this rural area." This is one of the criteria for a special use permit in the rural area if I'm understanding correctly. To my knowledge none of the members of CBI live or even frequent this road/rural area at all. In fact, CBI doesn't even include any information on how it is related to this rural area, or any benefits of their proposed development to any neighbors who are directly related to this area.

Not Wanted

- Petition
 - At the time I am writing this, there have been 334 people who have signed a petition to prevent the issuance of the special use permit for this development. Here is the link to this proposal. Please let me know if you'd like me to print the list of people who have signed it for your records as well.

 - Of the 120 land owners on DMR, 56 of them have signed the petition so far. That's <u>47%</u> of every home on the road.

The Multi-Use Building

- The proposed multi-use building raises concerns as a wedding venue, bar mitzvah, and bat mitzvah venue, and event space.
- An 11,000 sq ft building with no restrictions other than a 200-person capacity is problematic. The
 proposal must specify the hours of operation for events, the potential impact on noise and light
 ordinances, and a realistic parking solution for a large number of vehicles.
- The proposal is misleading in its presentation. This is not simply a "minimally invasive forest school."

Traffic

- The assertion that the proposal would result in "little discernible difference in traffic patterns" is not supported by the details provided.
- The estimated number of trips appears to be significantly underestimated. The volume of traffic, even based on the underestimated figures, would overwhelm the existing infrastructure and disrupt the rural character of the road.
- The proposed drop-off and pick-up timeframes are inadequate for young children, and the need for parking during these times has not been addressed.
- The proposal does not account for the traffic generated by teachers, administrators, staff, deliveries, and other service providers.

Disruption of Neighbors, Nature, and the Community

- Increased traffic, light pollution, noise pollution, and trash are inevitable consequences of the proposed development.
- The potential for light pollution from outdoor lighting would disrupt the natural darkness of the area.
- Noise from a large number of children, events, and other activities would disturb the tranquility of the neighborhood.
- The influx of people would likely lead to an increase in trash along the roadside and in surrounding areas.
- The environmental impact of automobile pollution, heating and cooling systems, potential gas generators, campfires, and sewage must be considered.
- The safety of pets who roam freely in the area would be jeopardized by the increased traffic.
- The development could potentially infringe upon the rights of neighboring residents to hunt and shoot on their own property.

Safety Concerns

- The increased traffic on the narrow, winding road would create a hazardous environment for both drivers and pedestrians.
- o The ability of fire and rescue squads to access the site in case of an emergency is questionable.
- The distance from the nearest hospital raises concerns in case of medical emergencies.
- The lack of shoulders on DMR poses risks for large vehicles and could lead to accidents.

Alternative Locations

• The proposed site does not offer unique features that cannot be found in other rural or even

- non-rural areas that are more suitable for such a development.
- The county's designated "development areas" provide better infrastructure, access to emergency services, and proximity to CBI.

• Requirements for Special Use Permit

- The project does not appear to "relate directly to this rural area," a criterion for a special use permit.
- The proposal does not demonstrate any benefits to the neighbors who are directly affected by this area.

• Community Opposition

 A significant number of residents have signed a petition opposing the issuance of a special use permit for this development. This demonstrates the strong sentiment against the proposal within the community.
