Please do not forget that not that long ago bison and elk played a critical role in riparian ecosystems. They were here in large numbers at one time. Their presence played a very positive role in the riparian environment by opening up pathways for other species to be able to utilize the aquatic resources. If one takes time to observe the interaction of domestic livestock, especially cattle, with riparian environments, you find that in a rangeland environment cattle play a very positive role. Their pathways provide trails for other species to get to and from the water. For example, Great Blue Herons, Green Herons, and Kingfishers need to be able get to a stream in order to feed on the minnows. I see minks near the streams at my place and I believe that cowpaths must be helpful to them as well. Butterflies of many types, dragonflies, and damselflies are often numerous around livestock trails that lead to the water. Your educational video mentions bacteria in the water. Please do not forget that bacteria are a naturally occurring thing in water and are an integral part of that ecosystem. Riparian habitats do far more than merely serve as buffers for urban drinking water supplies. Stream exclusion fencing has its place and can serve a useful purpose, but touting it as a BMP in all cases is just flat out wrong! Nothing could be more un-natural to a riparian ecosystem than to restrict access to wildlife in this way.

I received the postcard sent recently by the Stream Health Initiative. It is a good thing that you are reaching out directly to property owners, and you are correct that we have a stake in the process, one that has unfortunately been largely ignored in the past. You are tackling a very complex issue. Voluntary programs that contribute to improved water quality are good ideas. Every property owner has a unique situation. It is a very bad idea to try to use a "one size fits all approach" and enact mandatory policies that could put some farm owners out of business.
